BRAC JPGSPH successfully hosted the Global Conference on Implementation Science 2019 with Partners

The first ever Global Conference on Implementation Science (GCIS) was held in Dhaka, Bangladesh from June 29 - July 1, 2019. GCIS was co-hosted by the Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-Up (CoE-SISU), BRAC JPGSPH; and UNICEF Bangladesh; and co-sponsored by TDR, Geneva. The three-day conference brought together 250 participants from 30 countries that included Researchers, Implementers, and International Donor and Partner organizations.

The conference was Co-Chaired by **Dr Juanita Vasquez Escallon**, Evaluation Specialist, UNICEF, Bangladesh. The conference aimed to create a global platform with specialists and implementers from leading

organizations to understand and share their experiences on implementation science and research in scaling-up and sustaining social programmes in a national context.

The Conference began with a welcome address by **Professor Vincent Chang**, Vice-Chancellor, BRAC University, **Mr Tomoo Hozumi**, Country Representative UNICEF, Bangladesh; **Mr Syed**

Monjurul Islam, Deputy Executive Director, icddr,b; and Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid, Dean, BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health. In her welcome speech, Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid gave emphasis on working together across disciplines with the same goal and passion in public health to help the vulnerable community. Dr Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury, Advisor to BRAC JPGSPH gave the keynote speech.

Various plenary sessions took place on topics related to research capacity on implementation science for achieving the SDGs and UHC targets. 15 parallel sessions were organized over the course of the conference on topics ranging from strengthening IR capacity in the TDR supported postgraduate schemes, IR in response to the malnutrition challenge in Bangladesh and involving multi-sectoral collaboration.

Professor Vincent Chang, Vice Chancellor of BRAC University visited BRAC JPGSPH

Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid, Dean, welcomed **Professor Vincent Chang**, the Vice Chancellor (VC) of BRAC University, to BRAC JPGSPH on 20 May, 2019. Professor Chang met with the faculty, staff and senior management of the School, and shared his vision for the University. He also met with 27 students from 8 countries of the current (15th cohort) in the Master of Public Health (MPH) program.

After the Vice Chancellor's speech; Professor Sabina Rashid, Dean and **Professor Malabika Sarker**, Associate Dean of BRAC JPGSPH, gave a brief presentation of the School's achievements in our four core areas of Education, Training, and Research and Advocacy over the last few years, and the future vision of the School.

Dr Ahmed Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury, Adviser to the Developing Midwives Project at the School shared his few thoughts on how the School was already an internationally recognized institution and was looking forward to the leadership of the Vice Chancellor to take the University forward. The session was followed by a short Q & A session.



Dr Ayman El- Mohandes, Dean, Graduate School of Public Health and Health Policy, City University of New York (CUNY) visited BRAC JPGSPH

Dr Ayman El-Mohandes, Dean of the Graduate School of Public Health and Health Policy at the City University of New York (CUNY) visited the School on 30 June, 2019.

Dr El-Mohandes serves an elected member of the executive board of the American Public Health Association. Prior to his appointment to CUNY in 2013, he served as Dean of the College of Public Health at the University of Nebraska, where he was also a professor of epidemiology at the College of Public Health, and professor of pediatrics and of obstetrics/gynecology at the College of Medicine, University of Nebraska Medical Center.

In his presentation he gave an overview of CUNY, which is the third largest university in USA. The university has one of the most diverse student bodies in the United States, with students representing 208 countries. CUNY is the only public institution of its kind in the New York region and the only one in the nation to focus on urban public health. The School conducts research and creates new models of public health education and practice to solve urban health problems. Dr Ayman El-Mohandes emphasized on competency mapping and believes that integrated thinking is necessary for students at CUNY SPH.




Dr Magaly Blas, Director, Mamás del Río and Nila Tanzil, Founder of Taman Bacaan Pelangi Visited BRAC JPGSPH

Dr Magaly Blas and **Nila Tanzil** presented at a seminar on 24 June, 2019. Dr Magaly Blas worked as a Professor and researcher at the School of Public Health and Administration, Cayetano Heredia University, Lima, Peru. She is the Director of Mamás del Río, a program to improve maternal and newborn health in rural areas in the Peruvian Amazon. Nila Tanzil is the founder of Taman Bacaan Pelangi, a non-profit organization focused on promoting literacy in remote areas of eastern Indonesia.

In her presentation, Dr Blas focused on 'Mamás del Río (Mama River)'. Her organization works in improving maternal and child health in remote rural areas in the Peruvian Amazon. The Mama River Program is a health outreach program that uses smartphone technology to deliver educational content and document and monitor vital records and health statistics of pregnant women and newborns residing in remote rural areas of the Amazon region of Peru. Taman Bacaan Pelangi (Rainbow Reading Gardens) focuses on establishing children's libraries in remote areas of eastern Indonesia. Nila Tanzil presented how they encourage and nurture children's interest in reading by providing access to good books.

On 24 June 2019, Dr Blas and Nila Tanzil visited the BRAC Maternity Centre and BRAC Education Programme. They went to Shishu Niketon School in Gazipur and Pre-primary schools with ECERS (Early Childhood Environment Rating Scale) on 25 June. On 26 June, they visited BRAC Learning Centre, Mymensingh and Gonokendro (Community Library), Mymensingh.







Dr Michelle Williams, Dean, Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, Harvard University Visited BRAC JPGSPH

Dr Michelle A. Williams, Dean of the Faculty, Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health visited the School on 31 July, 2019. Dr Williams is an Angelopoulos Professor in Public Health and International Development, a joint faculty appointment at the Harvard Chan School and Harvard Kennedy School. **Richard Cash**, Senior Lecturer on Global Health in the Department of Population and International Health, Harvard University School of Public Health; and Visiting Professor at BRAC JPG School of Public Health introduced Dean Williams during her visit.

Dean Williams mentioned that this was her very first time in Bangladesh and talked about the public health situation including Rohingya crisis, the dengue fever outbreak and how health issues and explained that conquering epidemic and climate change, along with other humanitarian crisis and major challenges nowadays for Bangladesh. She hopes that the government along with other Public Health institutes like different NGOs and BRAC JPGSPH can come up with an holistic approach of confronting these challenges.

On the next day, Dr Williams visited Tuberculosis Control Programme at the TB Diagnostic Centre, Savar accompanied by **Dr Fatema Khatun**, Programme Manager, TB and **Dr Sinthia Tarin**, Senior Sector Specialist, TB. She also visited Developing Midwives Project's Dhaka Urban Centre at Mirpur with **Dr Selina Amin**, Head, Midwifery Education Programme and Project Director, BRAC JPGSPH and **Md Koushik Ahmed**, Deputy Director, BRAC JPGSPH. The School also hosted a dinner in honor of Dr Williams.

The 15th cohort of Master of Public Health students completed the field visit to Manikganj on 17-19 June, 2019, as part of the Health Economics & Health Care Financing module in the MPH program. The objective of this field-based experiential learning exercise was to provide students with the opportunity to learn how to design & modify a social health insurance scheme based on Bangladeshi client's and insurer's perspectives. Course on Measurement and Survey Design by CLEAR/J-PAL South Asia at Institute for Financial Management and Research (IFMR), India

J-PAL South Asia offered a three-day course for researchers and evaluation specialists from different disciplines on 8-10 May, 2019 in New Delhi, India.

The course focused on teaching key policy and research question related issues, how to design good survey instruments, how to pilot and refine a survey, and how to develop field protocols. Strengthening Voices and Capacities for Addressing Gender Based Violence in Bangladesh

BRAC JPGSPH and Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust (BLAST) organized a five-day short course from 14-18 July, 2019 on Sexual and Reproductive Health & Rights (SRHR) and Law with Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) funded by CREA.

A total of 21 participants joined the course from different organizations including Bandhu Social Welfare Society, Practical Action, World Vision, BRAC and Terre des Hommes Italia. Advocate **Sanaiyya Faheem Ansari**, Human Rights, Gender and SRHR Specialist, was the facilitator of the course. **Sudipta Mukhopadhyay**, resource person from India conducted sessions on understanding gender and SRHR, the evolution of SRHR agenda including ICPD and **Yogyakarta principle**. **Dr Debjyoti Ghosh**, Assistant Professor of Comparative Law, Asian University for Women (AUW), Chittagong conducted a session on how India brought an end to the decriminalization of Section 377 with a comparison to Bangladesh.

The five-day short course also had session on the struggles and challenges of Hijra (transgender) community where a transgender activist named **Shova Saker** shared her experience. **Farhana Alam**, Coordinator from BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University conducted the session on Diversity and Sexuality. **Farzana Wahid Shayan**, a renowned Singer, Gender Activist and Co-Founder of Visualizing Mental Health (VMH) joined the course.



Training on: Innovating Quality Patient Care Everyday

BRAC JPGSPH's GSK funded Public Health Leadership Development Training project has conducted a second training of its second component titled 'Innovating Quality Patient Care Everyday' with another set of participants from BAPSA (Association for Prevention of Septic Abortion, Bangladesh).

The purpose of this training is to apply innovative service quality improvements to Healthcare managers' patient services which enhance patient care. Design of this training program is based on the model of on the job coaching for 4 weeks and one day classroom facilitation.

The daylong classroom session was held on 10 July, 2019 at BAPSA Maternity Clinic in Dhaka Mirpur, where six mid-level managers from BAPSA clinic participated. Throughout the day they identified patient care experiences and improvements through role-play and walkway from entry to end point of each service delivery. They presented the patient care solutions to their supervisors and both parties agreed to implement the solutions at their workplace. The training program was facilitated by four BRAC JPGSPH facilitators by **Mikhail Islam**, Strategy and Design Consultant, **Anindya Das, Coordinator**; **Sairana Ahsan**, Research Fellow; and **Md Munirul Islam**, Senior Project Officer.

A Qualitative Evaluation of BRAC Humanitarian Play Lab (HPL) Model in Rohingya Camps in Bangladesh

Even though early childhood is established to be a critical period of growth and development in children, there is a lack of evidence of Early Childhood Development (ECD) interventions in humanitarian settings. Through the HPL model, BRAC is focusing on ECD of refugee children from their 1000th day till six years of age. This study aims to understand what makes the HPL model unique in the Rohingya refugee camp setting.

The study aims to learn the indigenous knowledge, attitudes and practices of the community in terms of ECD and play-based learning, evaluate the HPL's impact on learning, healing and coping of children, acceptability of HPL and play based learning, how Rohingya cultural aspects and practices are being preserved through the model and what impact it has on social cohesiveness. A proposal was prepared in June 2019 based on preliminary field observations and experience during the fieldwork for the process documentation study in April 2019.

Kaosar Afsana, Professor, BRAC JPGSPH is the PI of the project. **Nazrana Khaled**, Deputy Project Coordinator is the Co-PI. Other team members include **Raafat Hassan**, Research Associate; **Saiara Subah**, Research Psychologist; **Farhana Mahbub**, Research Psychologist; **Shamima Akter**, Research Assistant; and **Mahmuda Aktar Sarkar**, Qualitative Data Manager.



A Story of the Evolution of BRAC Humanitarian Play Lab (HPL) in Rohingya Camps of Bangladesh

BRAC Humanitarian Play Lab (HPL) is being implemented for Rohingya children aged 0-6 years in refugee camps of Cox's Bazar led by BRAC Institute of Education and Development. The model is run inside Child Friendly Spaces under Child Protection Sector. BRAC JPGSPH undertook Process Documentation (PD) of HPL to capture its evolution. A qualitative study was conducted to gather information interviewing service providers, field managers, major key stakeholders and community members and reviewing HPL documents.

The PD began in February 2019 and will continue till 2023. Data (September 2017-March 2019) highlighted how the play-based learning approach began in Sept 2017 and gradually scaled-up incorporating cultural elements, engaging Rohingya women as frontline workers, creating social cohesiveness, etc. Valuing context, culture, language and life in camps with empathy and respect, coping with the complexity of the camp coordination and developing a well-coordinated management system within BRAC have made the operations of the large scale BRAC HPL project possible with practical solutions on the ground.

Kaosar Afsana, Professor, BRAC JPGSPH is the PI of the project. Atiya Rahman, Sr Research Fellow and Nazrana Khaled, Deputy Project Coordinator are the Co-PIs.
Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid, Dean, BRAC JPGSPH and Director of Centre of Excellence for Gender, Sexual & Reproductive Health and Rights (CGSRHR), and AKM Mazharul Islam, Adjunct Professor are the Technical Experts. A Study of Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) of Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) in Bangladesh

MoU Signing

A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between the Directorate General of Health Services, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) and BRAC JPGSPH on 22 May, 2019 to facilitate the 'A Study of Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) of Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) in Bangladesh' project. Dr Nur Mohammad, Line Director, Non Communicable Disease Control of DGHS and Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid, Dean of BRAC JPGSPH signed the MoU for their respective organizations. Dr S M Mustafizur Rahman, Deputy Program Manager of DGHS, Md Tanvir Hasan, Assistant Professor and Co-Director, CUEH and PI of the project; Raia Azmi, Research Fellow and Co-PI; and Irin Akhter, Deputy Project Coordinator were also present there. According to the MoU, DGHS will provide technical assistance, facilitate field works and jointly organize dissemination events.

Workshop

Two brainstorming workshops were conducted to identify priority areas for sexual and reproductive health (SRH) research, SRH intervention and policy advocacy for persons with disabilities in Bangladesh. First brainstorming workshop took place on 23 April, 2019; attended by government officials from different Government Offices; academics from Department of Women and Gender Studies, University of Dhaka (DU); and BRAC Institute of Educational Development (BRAC IED). **Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid**, Dean, BRAC JPGSPH was the Chair of the event. Second brainstorming workshop was held with participants from different Non-Government Organizations (NGOs) and Disabled Peoples' Organisations (DPOs) on 25 April, 2019.

Field work

Piloting and pretesting of tools for the study took place during May 2019, in peri urban and rural areas of Tangail district and Bhashantek slum in Dhaka. In July, 60 field research assistants and 8 field coordinators were recruited, who underwent a week long training before fieldwork. BRAC JPGSPH research team and experts from Handicap International (HI), National Institute of Mental Health and Hospital (NIMH), Turning Point Foundation facilitated the training sessions. The data collection for the nationwide survey has started from 15 July, and is continuing in eight divisions of Bangladesh at present.











BRAC JPGSPH Hosted the first Annual Partners Meeting of Accountability and Responsiveness in Informal Settlements for Equity (ARISE) Hub

The ARISE (Accountability and Responsiveness in Informal Settlements for Equity) Hub hosted its first Annual Partners Meeting from 25-29 June, 2019 at BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health, BRAC University in Dhaka, Bangladesh. The ARISE Hub is a new multi-country research consortium set up to enhance accountability and improve the health and wellbeing of poor, marginalized people living in informal urban settlements in low-and-middle-income countries.

The meeting was attended by 36 delegates from 11 partner organizations of the ARISE consortium from five different countries - the United Kingdom, India, Kenya, Sierra Leone and Bangladesh. **Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid**, Dean, BRAC JPGSPH and PI, ARISE Bangladesh; all PIs of partner organizations; and ARISE Project PI **Sally Theobald**, Professor of Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine attended the meeting. **Dr Hossain Zillur Rahman**, Executive Chairman, Power and Participation Research Centre (PPRC) also attended the inauguration session as an Advisory Board member of the Consortium. **Asif Saleh**, Executive Director of BRAC also graced the meeting on behalf of BRAC.

ARISE Bangladesh partner BRAC JPGSPH also hosted a dinner where **Professor Vincent Chang**, Vice Chancellor, BRAC University; **Dr Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury**, Vice-Chair, BRAC and Advisor, BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University; and **KAM Morshed**, Director, BRAC Advocacy for Social Change, Technology and Partnership Strengthening Unit were present as well. ARISE Hub also organized a parallel session titled 'Accountability for Equity in Urban Informal Health: Lessons from the ARISE Partnership' on 30 June at Global Conference on Implementation Science and Scale-Up.

Health Seeking Behaviour for Sexual & Reproductive Health (SRH) Services of Rohingya Women in Rohingya Camps of Cox's Bazar: An Ethnographic Study

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In camps of Cox's Bazaar, Rohingya women and adolescent girls have minimum access to basic health care, such as, maternal and new-born care and other reproductive and sexual health-related services especially family planning. This study aims to illustrate health seeking behaviour of the Rohingya population by exploring their socio-cultural, religious beliefs and practices of pregnancy, childbirth, new-born care and family planning. The study is being funded by World Health Organization (WHO), Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh.

An applied anthropological approach has been used to explore the community perceptions and practices related to health seeking behaviour of pregnant and currently delivered women. The team conducted 27 In-Depth Interviews (IDIs) with pregnant women and women with a child aged less than 6 years, 19 Key Informant Interviews (KIIs) among which were formal and informal health providers, representatives from SRH organizations and community influential, four FGDs with husbands of pregnant and recently delivered women. Data collection has been commenced on Mid May 2019 and was continued to the end of June 2019.

A round-table on 'Exploring the Realities of Adolescent Girls and Boys: Findings from Gage Bangladesh Research' in Dhaka took place on 7 July, 2019 at the BRAC Centre. **Professor Sabina Rashid**, Dean, BRAC JPG School of Public Health, BRAC University and **Dr Mohammad Ashraful Haque**, Innovations for Poverty Action (IPA) jointly presented on the headline findings on six capability areas of the research. **Maheen Sultan**, Senior Fellow Practice, BRAC Institute of Governance and Development (BIGD), and GAGE Bangladesh Research Uptake and Impact Coordinator gave an overview of GAGE's research and research aims, partnerships and time frame.

Imran Matin. Executive Director. BIGD welcomed the participants at the round-table. Dr Mahamud-Ul-Hoque. Additional Secretary, Ministry of Education and National Program Coordinator, Secondary Education Development Program (SEDP) Project gave opening statement on the importance of GAGE Programme for Bangladesh. A panel discussion on 'Harnessing the potential of adolescents as Bangladesh reaches middle-income status education, skills and well-being' took place at the round table. The Gender and Adolescence: Global Evidence (GAGE) project's qualitative aspect is led by the Centre of Excellence for Gender, Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights (CGSRHR) at BRAC JPGSPH with partnership with BIGD. The quantitative part is led by IPA.



Understanding the Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights of Male Youth in Bangladesh

The study team conducted a nationwide quantitative data collection for 11,110 individuals (15-24 years old males) from 370 unions across 8 divisions during April-June, 2019. An extensive desk review was performed to identify the gaps and challenges of existing programs and policies regarding the Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) for the male youth. As a continuation of the study plan, to identify the challenges of implementation in SRH program for male youth, the team gathered expert opinion from **Mallick Sayeed Mahbub**, Joint Secretary; and **Md Faruk Ahmed**, Director General and Additional Secretary of the Ministry of Youth and Sports, Government of Bangladesh (GoB).

A Global Social Sciences Network for Infectious Threats and Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) - SoNAR Global

The SoNAR Global Scientific Advisory Board Meeting was held on June 12, 2019. The Objective of this Teleconference meeting was to take a decision on which community engagement structures will be piloted in Work Package 4: The Development of Models of Multiscale, Dialogue-based Engagement with Local Stakeholders in Bangladesh (Task 4.2) and Eastern Europe (Task 4.3).

Along with BRAC JPGSPH, all the lead partners of work package 4 including NIVEL-Netherlands Institute for Health Services Research, Netherlands; Medical University of Vienna, Austria; Makerere University, Uganda; Public Health Center (PHC), Ukraine; University College London, UK; Institut Pasteur, France and the Sonar Global Scientific Advisory Board (SAB) members also representative from WHO joined the teleconference.

Three country presentations were made based on mapping exercise and review of various community engagement structures in Bangladesh, Uganda, and Ukraine. We draw upon various community engagement (CE) projects to assess the ability of existing structures and tailored the assessment country specifically. This mapping exercise followed various steps; e.g. searching for relevant documents, preparing inventory, review, analysis of project documents and finally develop a tentative community engagement model. For Bangladesh, the blue print of model focused AMR and infection threats, in Ukraine on influenza/measles vaccination, in Uganda on Ebola and AMR preparedness.



Leave No One Behind - Exploring the Healthcare-Seeking Behavior of Floating Population (Street Dwellers) in Dhaka, Bangladesh: A Pilot Study

International Civil Society Organizations (ICOS), sharing a common platform, came up with a multi-year project 'Leave No One Behind' in 2017 for addressing the problem of marginalized population. BRAC JPGSPH study team explored current scenario and data availability for different groups of marginalized population in Bangladesh through a rapid review in 2018. After conducting the rapid review, ICOS was interested to conduct a study to explore the problem of the marginalized people in Dhaka city, therefore, BRAC JPGSPH developed the proposal accordingly. The study aimed to explore the scenario of health care seeking behavior and available health care services, and identify gaps at the policy and programme levels for achieving universal health coverage in Bangladesh by 2030 for the street dwellers and floating population.

The study team conducted 15 In-Depth Interviews (IDIs) and 6 informal discussions with the adult (age>18 years) street dwellers/floating populations in three selected areas (Kamalapur rail station, High Court Mazar Premises, and Sadarghat launch terminal). After that, we conducted Key Informant Interviews (KIIs) with the relevant Health Care Providers (HCPs) from public medical college hospitals and NGOs and the Policymakers (high government officials). Findings revealed that most of the floating people/street dwellers were from the lower socio-economic class of the society and most of them were landless and homeless. In terms of health-seeking behavior, most of the IDI respondents preferred visiting drug shops and only a few of them visited formal health facilities when the disease was severe.



Transparency, Accountability and Good Governance for Health System Strengthening and Advancing UHC Agenda in Bangladesh: The Role of Frontline Healthcare Service Providers in Improving Performance

Transparency, Accountability and Good Governance for Health System Strengthening and Advancing UHC Agenda in Bangladesh: the Role of Frontline Healthcare Service Providers in Improving Performance project is currently being implemented under Centre of Excellence for Health Systems and Universal Health Coverage (CoE-HS&UHC) at BRAC JPGSPH.

Professor Syed Masud Ahmed, Director of the Centre of Excellence for Health Systems and Universal Health Coverage (CoE-HS&UHC) is the PI and **Dr Nahitun Naher**, Sr Research Fellow, is the Co-PI of the Bangladesh study of the project. The team also includes **Dr Bushra Zarin Islam**, Sr Research Associate, **Raihanul Islam**, Research Associate and three Data Collection Officers.

The team completed data collection for the quantitative component of the study which comprises a Discrete Choice Experiment (DCE) including a provider survey on doctors' absenteeism. Between April-August 2019, the study team collected 300 plus data from doctors working in four tertiary public hospitals: Shaheed Suhrawardi Medical College Hospital (ShSMC), Sir Salimullah Medical College & Mitford Hospital (SSMC), Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU), Mugda Medical College & Hospital. Doctors who have experience of working in rural facilities in the last ten years participated in the survey. The findings are expected to assist informed policy decision making addressing absenteeism and rural retention of doctors. Study team is currently analyzing the survey data to present the early findings in partners' conference to be held in September, 2019 in London, UK.





Assessing BRAC's Innovative Health Loans in Protecting the Poor against Health and Asset Vulnerability in Bangladesh

BRAC has been running an innovative Medical Treatment Loan (MTL), offering medical loans with individually defined, repayment schedules to microcredit clients in need of medical care since 2013. With the support from the Inequality Challenge Project, The Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) has commissioned a grant to BRAC JPGSPH to address these challenges by complementing the existing MTL program through a decentralization and digitalization reform, as well as through innovations in product design. In addition, the proposed program design allows for a rigorous evaluation regarding the effects and processes of BMC's implemented revised MTLs.

The developed product designed by BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health, BRAC University has been finalized and approved by BRAC Microfinance team. The team worked with BRAC Microfinance team in launching the product among the beneficiaries. Training was conducted among relevant BRAC staffs – Regional Managers (RMs), Area Managers (AMs), Branch Managers (BMs), and Program Officers (POs). BRAC JPGSPH team also conducted training among beneficiary groups. BRAC Microfinance effectively launched the developed product by conducting on-board sessions which introduced staffs to the new product and assigned their responsibilities.

Professor Malabika Sarker, Associate Dean and Director, Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-Up (CoE-SISU), BRAC JPGSPH, is the PI of the study. Atonu Rabbani, Associate Scientist is the Co-PI. Md Nazmul Islam, Research Fellow; Mushfiqur Rahman, Research Associate; Rubaiya Riya Siddiqua, Senior Research Assistant, Sanjana Nujhat, Research Associate; Ibrahim Hossain Sajal, Statistician - are working as investigators for the project. Jony Barnard Mackfield, Field Coordinator; and Md Ashraful Alam, Sr Field Coordinator are part of the Research team.



Through a two-step approach, the study investigates elicit social norms concerning the use of violence in response to spousal behavior. Based on the findings the study will design an intervention aimed at reducing the incidence of domestic violence in Bangladesh. BRAC JPGSPH has received grants from South African Medical Research Council (SAMRC) and Canadian Grand Challenges; and intends to initiate the project from June, 2019. The research teams are currently developing the necessary tools for data collection, the piloting phase will be initiated from July-August 2019.

Atonu Rabbani, Associate Scientist, BRAC JPG School of Public Health is the Co-PI of the project. The project also has two international Co-Pls - Paula Lopez-Pena and Nina Buchmann. Mushfigur Rahman, Research Associate, BRAC JPGSPH is working as an investigator.





Entertainment Education Campaign

UNICEF Bangladesh has launched a trans-media entertainment education campaign for changing social norms of engaging in child marriage in high prevalent child marriage areas in Bangladesh. This campaign is focused on shifting community perception and attitude regarding child marriage along with other closely related critical issues like menstrual hygiene, adolescent health and healthcare seeking behavior, safe sex, enrolment, and retention in secondary schools, sexual abuse and harassment.

BRAC JPGSPH, BRAC University with the support of UNICEF formulated and operationalized an evaluation framework to evaluate the impact of this trans-media campaign on the expected improvement of attitude and shift of perception regarding adolescent developmental issues. Multiple surveys (baseline, midline, and end line) on the same cohort of the population with a mixed-method approach was designed to evaluate the impact of 13 the trans-media campaign. The team is now preparing to conduct the end-line survey through tool finalization, enumerator recruitment and training.

Health, Hygiene and Housing in Bangladesh (Phase II)

Implemented under the Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-Up (CoE-SISU) at BRAC JPGSPH, the study focuses on upgrading housing (through concrete floor construction) and finding outcomes in children's (under five) risks of exposures from mud floors. The implementation is conducted by ADESH (Association of Development for Economic & Social Help), and the program is funded by ARCHIVE Global.

The end line quantitative survey is on-going. Additionally the qualitative IDIs and FGDs among the beneficiaries are also being conducted. The end line survey is being conducted in Dhamrai and Savar, two sub-districts in peri-urban areas of the capital city Dhaka with total of 315 sample households. The endline report with detailed analysis and findings from the survey will be shared with the donor by September 2019. **Professor Malabika Sarker**, Associate Dean and Director, Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-Up (CoE-SISU), BRAC JPGSPH, is the PI of the study.

Implementation Research Focusing on Health System Strengthening in UNICEF Supported Areas in Bangladesh

The project aims to identify the key implementation challenges and explore opportunities for scale-up in UNICEF supported areas in Cox's Bazar district, Bangladesh for improving the health and well-being of the Rohingya people. Keeping that in mind several key implementation challenges regarding the implementation of MNCH programme for the Rohingyas were identified using a scoping review of literature and a series of Key informant interviews done with key personnel working in the field during Phase-1 which ended in March 2019.

In Phase-2, the activities includes refining IR questions, develop details methodology and obtain ethical approval, data collection, report writing and arranging a dissemination workshop and policy dialogue at the end of the project period. The timeline is from May 2019 till October 2019. The field data collection for the project took place from 2 to 15 July, 2019 in several Rohingya camps in Ukhiya, Cox's Bazar.

Professor Malabika Sarker, Associate Dean and Director, Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-Up (CoE-SISU), BRAC JPGSPH, is the Principal Investigator (PI) for the project. **Yameen Majumdar**, Sr Project Consultant; **Avijit Saha**, Research Fellow and Focal Person; **Mowtushi Matin**, Research Associate; and **Saima Mehjabeen**, Research Associate are also involved in the project.



Partnership to Ensure the Sustainability of a Public Health Palliative Care Project in Bangladesh through Community Theatre: A Follow on Project

The project aims to explore local contexts, indigenous knowledge, cultural practices, values and languages of death, dying and end of life care in the specific urban slums of Bangladesh. Funded by AHRC UK, 'Partnership to Ensure the Sustainability of a Public Health Palliative Care Project in Bangladesh through Community Theatre', is a collaboration between BRAC JPG School of Public Health with partners in the UK and Bangladesh.

A dissemination and film screening on 'Raising Palliative Care through Community Theatre' was held on 21 April, 2019 at ULAB auditorium. Another meeting was held with all local partners on 23 April, 2019 to share the experiences and observation of all participants based on their first-year work experience. A half-day-long training session was held on 5 May, 2019 to discuss all the relevant topics for all interdisciplinary partner's mutual understanding such as Public Health, Anthropology, Palliative Care, Art and theatre at Centre for Palliative Care (CPC), BSMMU. Field Data collection is ongoing for the project. The first phase of Ethnography started from 15 May, 2019. The second phase of the study is also ongoing at the Narayanganj City Corporation.

Synthesis and Translation of Research and Innovations from Polio Eradication (STRIPE)

The Synthesis and Translation of Research and Innovations from Polio Eradication (STRIPE) study has already started to develop a course under 10 global health knowledge domains as a part of the next phase of the project. Each prioritized domain will be organized into an academic module and addresses core competencies in Implementation Science using examples from Polio. For this purpose, a global teaching team has been already selected by John Hopkins University.

Professor Malabika Sarker, Associate Dean and Director, Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-Up (CoE-SISU), BRAC JPGSPH; **Dr Yameen Mazumder**, Senior Project Specialist, CoE-SISU; and **Dr Humayra Binte Anwar**, Research Associate will be part of the teaching team from BRAC JPGSPH.

A parallel session was conducted under the STRIPE project at the Global Conference on Implementation Science and Scale-Up 2019. The parallel session was comprised of presentations explaining the initial findings of the STRIPE study and comparing implementation of a complex initiative within seven country cases and across epidemiological typologies. The session was chaired by **Dr Tajul Islam A Bari**, Former Program Manager, Expanded Program on Immunization (EPI), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Bangladesh. Following the session, STRIPE project conducted a Teaching Team meeting on July 3, 2019 at BRAC JPGSPH with partners from Indonesia, India, Nigeria, Ethiopia, and the USA.



The Ethics of Health Policy Experiments: A Global Framework for Design and Oversight

The Ethics of Health Policy Experiments: A Global Framework for Design and Oversight Data collection is ongoing in the pilot phase of the project 'The Ethics of Health Policy Experiments: A Global Framework for Design and Oversight'. This project is a collaboration between BRAC JPG School of Public Health with Researchers from University of Heidelberg; the TH Chan School of Public Health, Harvard University; and the School of Public Health and Social Sciences, Muhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences (MUHAS).

A TRIBUTE TO PROFESSOR DAVID SANDERS



PROFESSOR DAVID SANDERS

We are deeply saddened by the passing of Professor David Sanders, a visionary public health activist and an internationally renowned pediatrician and public health researcher, who spent over fifty years working in Zimbabwe, UK and South Africa.

Professor Sanders was a founding member of People's Health Movement (PHM) at its creation in 2000 in Savar, Bangladesh and has been the co-chair of PHM for the past six years. He was the founding director of the School of Public Health (SOPH) at University of Western Cape in Capetown, South Africa from its inception in 1993 till 2009. He contributed immensely to health and education policy development, at both national and provincial levels, in South Africa. He is the author of many peer reviewed articles and three books: The Struggle for Health; Questioning the Solution; and Fatal Indifference: The G8, Africat and Global Health.

Dr Mushtaque Chowdhury, Adviser and founding Dean of BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health expressed his deepest condolences on the passing of David Sanders. He recalled their friendship and mentioned that David's passing is an irreparable loss to the movement for people's health. Dr Chowdhury also recalled David's efforts to organize the first PHA in Savar in 2000 with Dr Zafrullah Chowdhury, the founder of Gonoshasthaya Kendra and renowned Public Health Activist at the birth of People's Health Movement (PHM).
