

The BracU logo was designed by renowned artist Mr. Hashem Khan in 2001.



Brac University lays foundation stone of permanent campus



Brac University reached a new echelon on Saturday, October 26, 2019, laying the foundation stone of its permanent campus in Merul Badda of Dhaka.

Sir Fazle Hasan Abed, KCMG, Founder and Chairperson Emeritus, BracU Board of Trustees, and BracU President and Vice-Chancellor Professor Vincent Chang did the honour while Tamara Hasan Abed, Chairperson, Board of Trustees of Brac University, was present.

Professor Chang pronounced this launching, coupled with a new vision and mission, as a milestone for BracU literally and figuratively, and added that classes at the new campus may be expected to start from the Summer 2021 semester.

Thanking Sir Abed for the foundation of BracU as well as for being a giant of humanity, Professor

Chang added that it was the responsibility of all involved to pursue the university's mission so that it could last and serve for hundreds of years.

Reading out Sir Abed's speech on his behalf, Ms. Abed said BracU was a place for creating progressive and innovative human beings and was playing a big role in social development by carrying out world-class research and building leadership quality among students.

To that end, she remarked, the technical mastery and architectural beauty of the new campus is unique and the latest in Bangladesh. Considering the need for a space to encourage creativity, this campus was designed with swathes of open spaces filled with greenery.

Students, faculty members, alumni and officials of BRAC and BracU were present at the event.

Brac University 13th Convocation and Ban Ki-moon gives his first overseas commencement speech at Brac University







On November 23, 2019, Former United Nations Secretary-General, Ban Ki-Moon addressed BracU's 13th Convocation as the commencement speaker. This was the first time he spoke at an overseas convocation. The former Secretary-General supports education, global citizenship and energising students, and has been a lifelong believer of the broad possibilities of education and youth.

Earlier that day, Professor Chang and Foreign Minister Dr Momen received Mr Ban Ki-moon at the airport and sent him off later that night. Notably, this was the second time he visited Dhaka and it opened up the possibility for other upcoming visits.

President and BracU Chancellor, Md Abdul Hamid chaired the convocation held at the Bangladesh Army Stadium. Education Minister Dr, Dipu Moni, Foreign Affairs Minister Dr, Abdul Momen and BracU Board of Trustees Chairperson Tamara Hasan Abed also spoke at the event.

Other members of the Board of Trustees were present at the ceremony. In total more than 9,000 people attended the event.

JPGSPH Hosted Global Conference on Implementation Science 2019

The first ever Global Conference on Implementation Science (GCIS) was held at the Radisson Blu Water Garden Hotel, Dhaka, Bangladesh from June 29 to July 1, 2019. GCIS 2019 was co-hosted by the Centre of Excellence for Science of Implementation and Scale-up (CoE-SISU), Brac James



P Grant School of Public Health at BracU (BRAC JPGSPH), and UNICEF Bangladesh, and cosponsored by TDR, Geneva. The three-day conference was observed successfully bringing 250 participants from 30 countries and included researchers, implementers, international donor and partner organizations working with Bangladesh-based NGOs and Government officials on a single platform.

"This is the era of implementation science and the conference here today is so very timely! We not only want to showcase the role of implementation research but are also keen to enable a global knowledge sharing platform", said Professor Malabika Sarker, Associate Dean, Director of Research and Director, CoE-SISU, BRAC JPGSPH. Professor Sarker along with Dr. Juanita Vasquez Escallon, Evaluation Specialist, UNICEF, Bangladesh co-chaired the event.

The conference aimed to create a global platform with the participation of specialists and implementers from leading organizations to understand and share their experiences on implementation science and research in scaling-up and sustaining social sector program in a given national context.

The Conference began with a welcome address by Professor Vincent Chang, Vice-Chancellor, BracU, Mr Tomoo Hozumi, Country Representative

UNICEF, Bangladesh, Mr Syed Monjurul Islam, Deputy Executive Director, icddr,b, and Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid, Dean, BRAC JPGSPH. In her welcome speech, Professor Sabina Faiz Rashid gave emphasis on working together across disciplines with the same goal and passion in

public health to help the vulnerable community.

Opening speeches were delivered by Dr Shamsul Alam, Member, General Economics Division, Ministry of Planning, Government of Bangladesh (GoB), Dr, Meerjady Sabrina Flora, Director of the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR); and Dr, Md Nazmul Islam, Line Director, Medical Education and Health Manpower Development, Directorate General of Health Services. Fifteen parallel s plenary sessions were held over the course of the conference on topics ranging from strengthening IR capacity in the TDR supported postgraduate schemes, IR in response to the malnutrition challenge in Bangladesh and involving multi-sectoral collaboration.

The closing session was participated by Professor Kaosar Afsana, BRAC JPGSPH, Samuel Bickel, Regional Evaluation Advisor, UNICEF ROSA, Olakunle Alonge, Assistant Professor, John Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, Professor Sally Theobald, Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine, Dr. Till Barnighausen, and Dr. Md Rizwanul Karim, Program Manager, Noncommunicable Disease Control Program, Directorate General of Health Services, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of Bangladesh.

The conference formally came to an end with the closing remarks of Professor Sarker.

International Conference on Business and Management held

The conference had about 250 participants, including more than 40 foreign delegates from different countries, namely Taiwan, Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore, Thailand, Nigeria, India, Sweden, and Canada. More than 170 academic papers were presented in 24 different parallel sessions. The conference closed with the Minister distributing the Best Paper Award, and other crests and certificates among participants.

ICEPE 2019 ends with a hope of a prosperous Bangladesh



A three-day International Conference on Energy and Power Engineering (ICEPE 2019) organized by The Department of Electrical and Electronic Engineering (EEE) of Brac University (BU) was held at the Brac CDM, Savar, from March 14 to 16, 2019.

Dr Tawfiq-e-Elahi Chowdhury, Bir Bikram, Energy Advisor to the Prime Minister, inaugurated the conference as the chief guest. He said that Bangladesh's transformation has been tremendous in the past 10 years with the percentage of people getting access to electricity increasing from 45 to 90 percent. He expected more collaboration among the IEEE Power and Energy Society and others present at the conference in solving problems of Bangladesh's power sector. The technical co-sponsor of the event was the IEEE Power and Energy Society.

Professor Saifur Rahman, President of the IEEE Power and Energy Society, said there were 5 million papers in IEEE Power and Energy Society database, which sees 3 million downloads every month.

It contains export-oriented ready-made garment factory names, GPS location, postal address, number of workers, products, export countries, brands and buyers, and memberships, affiliations, and certifications; all of which was collected by

enumerators by going door-to-door. The map is scheduled to be expanded by 2021 to incorporate factories across the country.

"Mapped in Bangladesh" enables a collective action approach to advancements in the garment sector by bringing together key industry stakeholders," said Linda Patentas, Program Manager for Cities, Supply Chains, and Migration at Brac USA.

"Transparency tools like Mapped in Bangladesh can continue to strengthen improvements and facilitate growth in the readymade garment industry," she added.

About

Brac Business School (BBS) began its journey in the year 2001 as a department at BracU before evolving into a school in 2006. Within this short period of time, the school has made its mark as a center of excellence in the academic and business communities through a rigorous, discipline-based approach to business education.

The aim of BBS is to inspire excellence through the quality of business education, training, research and advisory services it delivers. Excellence is a target that changes fast in a constantly evolving business environment and the school strives to enhance the ability of students to learn and adapt better through analytical thinking. With a mission to create and disseminate knowledge in the field of business and management, BBS focuses to develop its students through creating a bridge between theory and reality of business.

Our Academic Programs

BBS has three programs. They are BBA (Bachelor of Business Administration), MBA (Masters' of Business Administration) and EMBA (Executive Masters' of Business Administration), which cater to different segments of the market. Though the programs vary in pedagogy, they have one common goal of creating individuals who can propel an organization forward. Specialization may be attained in one or more of the following areas: Accounting, Finance, Human Resource Management, Marketing, Information Management, Entrepreneurship, Supply Chain Management and Operations Management.

The BBA program, with the versatility of concentrations, aims at enabling the students to learn and practice state-of-the-art business and management concepts, principles, tools, techniques and methods, and to help them become outstanding business leaders in the highly dynamic global environment of the twenty first century. By the end of the year 2019, a total of 302 students (154 males and 148 females) were awarded with Masters' of Business Administration degree.

The Executive MBA (EMBA) Program of Brac Business School (BBS) focuses primarily on the implementation of practical applications and is adapted to meet today's business requirements as well as future opportunities and encounters of multinational environment in a sustainable manner. It is designed for business leaders and managers, civil servants, social entrepreneurs, NGO executives, military officials and other professionals. The core objective of the EMBA program is to develop ethical and competent future business leaders with a solid global outlook who will demonstrate confidence and excellence in managerial leadership, decision-making, critical thinking and teamwork. By the end of the year 2019, a total of 103 students (69 males and 34 females) were awarded with Executive Masters' of Business Administration degree.

Faculty and Administration Overview

Some of the finest teachers, specialized in business education, are working at BBS and highclass practitioners supplement their endeavors. The BBS is proud to have some prominent and nationally recognized professors in its faculty pool: Professor Dr. Mirza Azizul Islam (former Adviser, Caretaker Government of Bangladesh), Professor Dr. Akbar Ali Khan (former Adviser, Caretaker Government of Bangladesh) and Professor Dr. Salehuddin Ahmed (former Governor, Bangladesh Bank). During the year 2019, three more professors: Dr. Mahboob Rahman, Dr. M Mujibul Haque and Dr. Abdul Hoque, and one Associate Professor, Dr. Sebastian Groh, joined the school; and Dr. Sharmin Shabnam Rahman rejoined as Assistant Professor upon completion of her doctoral degree. As part of continuous professional development, fifteen BBS faculty members are currently pursuing their PhD degrees in accredited foreign universities. In addition to the regular faculty members, the school has a large pool of adjunct faculty members from business, autonomous bodies, and research & academic institutions. The Academic Committee of the school consists of all full-time faculty members and is headed by Dean - Dr. Mahboob Rahman during the year 2019. The committee supervises all academic affairs of the school, including curriculum and quality assurance. The Administration Team of BBS consists of two Associate Deans (Academics and Research), three Program Directors (BBA, MBA and EMBA), four Area Directors (Accounting and Finance; Marketing; Management and Human Resources; Supply Chain, Technology and Operations Management), and four Assistant Deans (Industry,

International and Alumni; Counseling and Placement; Accreditation and Quality; and Pedagogy and Assessment).

Heightened Emphasis on Academic Standard, Curriculum, Quality Assurance and International Accreditation

During the year 2019, a number of initiatives were undertaken to assure superior academic standard for all BBS programs and enhanced learning experience of BBS students.

First, syllabuses of all BBS courses were standardized with focus on clearly stated learning objectives, intended learning outcomes, teaching methods, assessment scheme, detailed list of topics and subtopics with specific activity schedule, and explicit academic policies with regards to student performance, expectations and academic integrity.

Second, the faculty performance appraisal scheme was restructured to include peer evaluation of teaching through classroom visits and assessment of course syllabus and content, learning materials and assessment instruments.

Third, curriculum revision process of all three BBS programs (BBA, MBA and EMBA) was initiated with analysis of current curriculum and benchmarking to curricula of leading world universities with the objective to contemporize curriculum, to align to BBS and BracU strategy (student-centricity, international standardization, knowledge creation and elevating human values), and to deliver impactful teaching and learning.

All these efforts were instrumental in BBS attaining eligibility for EDAF (EFMD GN Deans Across Frontier) accreditation. The plan is to use it as a stepping-stone towards the long-term goal of achieving EFMD (European Foundation for Management Development) accreditation. All faculty members participated actively in these efforts and contributed towards these accomplishments.

A Conversation on Climate Justice

In November 2019, BBS along with the Centre for Climate Change and Environmental Research (C3ER) jointly organized the screening of the internationally acclaimed documentary 2040 The Regeneration and a follow-up conversation on Climate Justice, was moderated by Dr. Sebastian Groh, Associate Professor at BBS. James P Grant School of Public Health was founded in 2004 in Dhaka, Bangladesh to address the unmet public health challenges particular to Asia, Africa and South America. Since inception:

- The School has 210 multidisciplinary faculty and staff
- The MPH program has had 524 Graduates from 34 countries
- 127 research projects were undertaken
- Over 109 Partnerships with Global and National Research, Academic & Development Organisations
- 612 Peer reviewed Publications (journal articles, International book chapters, etc.)
- 6200 trained: health and development professionals
- Over 214 active civil society and engagements with key stakeholders to influence and impact on program and policies.

Vision

To be the leading global Public Health Institute for the world's critical health challenges affecting disadvantaged communities.

Mission

To create innovative public health leaders and solutions through cutting-edge, experiential Education, Training, Research and Advocacy

The school has four core pillars: (1) Education (2) Training (3) Research (4) Advocacy

Education

The locus of the MPH program is its experiential community immersive teaching through rigorous urban and rural fieldwork. Facilitating this realworld contextual learning are the BRAC JPGSPH's reputed global and national professors grounded in critical public health research, practice and programmers from international institutions including Harvard University, USA; Stanford, USA McGill University, Canada; Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine, UK; UNSW, Australia, Makerere University, and nationally reputed institutions: BRAC, icddr,b and others. The School was featured as one of the top 6 Public Health Schools in the region by WHO in 2007 (https://www.who.int/ bulletin/volumes/85/12/07-011207/en), and in 2020 featured in Johns Hopkins University's Global Health Now as a top School in the region (https://www.globalhealthnow.org /2019-08/10fixes-global-health-consulting-malpractice).

In 2019-2020 our 15th batch has a total of 27 students with 11 international and 16 national students.

A 3-year project led by the School-TRANS4M-PH funded by ERASMUS+ under the European Union aims to develop contextualized teaching and learning methodologies in Public Health with Independent University Bangladesh and Asian University of Women, Chittagong.

RESEARCH:

Since its inception, the School has been engaged in 127 research projects. In the last 2.5 years the School has had over 120 Peer reviewed Publications (2018, 2019, up to June, 2020). These projects are investigating the most pressing public health needs of the country to identify evidence-based solutions, inform program and policies under The Five Centers of Excellence:

- Gender and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (established in 2008)
- 2. Health Systems and Universal Health Coverage (established in 2012)
- 3. Urban Equity and Health (established in 2013)
- 4. Science of Implementation & Scale-up (established in 2016)
- 5. Non-communicable Diseases and Nutrition (established in 2017).

In addition to the 5 Centers, the faculty conducted Humanitarian Research in the Rohingya Camps and host communities. The School has over 109 Partnerships with Global and National Research, Academic & Development Organisations.

TRAINING:

Centre for Professional Skills development in Public Health, established in 2007, offers unique and innovative pedagogic methods with interactive





discussions, experiential learning exposures, community and facility visits, multi-media engagement, role-playing, and other forms of hands-on practical and online learning. The School has conducted over 45 trainings, workshops, and capacity building seminars/webinars in 2019, some of which are projected to be completed by June, 2020.

ADVOCACY:

The School believes in advocating for change in policies and working closely with stakeholders to push agendas that are of critical national and global importance. There have been over 214+ advocacy events. Thirteen policy influencing meetings took place in 2019. Selected notable achievements from 2019 includes the Global Conference on Implementation Science and Scale-Up over 250 participants from 30 countries (https://sisugcis.com/), Implementation Research focusing on Health System strengthening in UNICEF supported areas in Cox's Bazar District, Bangladesh.

Leadership: Professor Sabina F Rashid is Dean of the School since 2013. Professor Malabika Sarker is the Associate Dean, with a Senior Management team of 15, which includes eight professors, two associate professors and one assistant acientist, besides the Head of Developing Midwives Project and her senior team.





School of Law

Founded in 2004, the School of Law at BracU is a gateway through which students are prepared for careers in law, in administrative services, the judiciary and in the development sector. The four-year undergraduate program at the School of Law culminates into a Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) degree for successful students. Although the primary emphasis of the program is on law and the legal profession, given that Law is also intertwined with economics, development, business and sociology, it also prepares students who are inclined to seek professions in other disciplines.

The faculty of the School of Law are handpicked for their academic excellence and individual expertise. They bring with them teaching-learning experiences from Universities in Europe, Australia and Asia. The faculty has individual expertise in the areas of criminal law, gender studies, business laws, international trade laws, cyber laws and human rights; all of which are shared with the students in course work and in workshops and lecture programs organised by the School.

Recognising BRAC's background and the goals and commitments of BracU, the School of Law endeavours to impart legal education to seek legal solutions that respect social, cultural and aesthetic needs of the people. To meet this goal, it strives to impart to its students not only the tenets of the law, but also legal philosophy, rights-based issues and a broader awareness of the society they live in. Graduates from the School of Law are now pursuing careers as lawyers, judges, corporate legal officers, development workers and academics.

Given the excellent legal education imparted by the faculty and the high achievements and visibility in moot court competitions, legal firms give preference to graduates from Dhaka University and BracU, when they seek interns and associates. Opening an LL.M. program will greatly improve and strengthen our academic ranking.

The School of Law has eight full-time faculty members. Two others are on regular course contract, of which one is a former Honourable Justice of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court and the other is a practicing lawyer of the Supreme Court. The faculty have degrees from universities from Europe and Asia and bring with them teaching methods observed there. The full-time faculty have undergone the Professional Development Course run by the University and are putting their learning into practice. In 2004, the School of Law started its journey with six students. In the year 2019, the School had over 600 students.

The following paragraphs give a brief description of the activities of the School and its faculty members for 2019.

1. Significant achievements in 2019

The School of Law, in 2019, reached another milestone by organising its first national level moot court competition, the First Khondker Mahbubuddin Ahmed Memorial Moot Court Competition 2019 (held on January 25th -26th, 2019).

The School of Law Mooting team became runners up at the biggest moot court competition organised in Bangladesh to date - the "2nd DUMCS-TIB Anti-Corruption Moot Court Competition 2019", organised by Dhaka University Moot Court Society and Transparency International Bangladesh on November 28 -30, 2019. 26 teams representing 26 different Law Schools/Departments around Bangladesh participated in this competition.

The School of Law team won the Law Olympiad Champions trophy for the third consecutive year in October 2019. The Olympiad is organised every year by the Society for Critical Legal Studies, Department of Law, Chittagong University, in Chittagong.

Department of Architecture



The School of Architecture and Design includes the Department of Architecture offering an undergraduate degree through a five-year curriculum of Bachelor of Architecture program, a Postgraduate Program in Disaster Management (PPDM) offering Graduate degrees, and an Interior Design Program offering Certificate programs in Interior Design.

Department of Architecture

2019 was a year of continued effort for the Department of Architecture to uphold its vibrant and excellent academic environment. In the studios and lecture courses, creativity was inspired, search for the unknown was encouraged and grounding in the context was emphasized. An air of creativity flowed from studio to studio, which was visible at the exhibitions of the student works. Arch Week 2019 was organized at Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy to showcase students' works and other activities. This inspired the whole student body towards design excellence. The student design works stressed on thorough understanding and analyses of the aesthetic, functional, environmental and contextual considerations in totality. The teachers, as always, were devoted to quench the students' thirst for knowledge. Additionally, in the studios, the challenges of a rapidly developing country were dovetailed with the awareness of global trends in architecture and technology.

The department started its journey 17 years ago in 2002 with 17 students and 3 teachers with a lot of enthusiasm, dedication, goodwill and commitment to create something new and different; and now shows a positive achievement towards that goal. It now has about 400 students and 18 highly qualified teachers. The total number of graduates in architecture till now is 429. To further develop the department, the utmost importance is now being given to upholding the academic standards by revisiting and revising the curriculum, the rules and regulations of the submissions and the attendance. Besides, students and teachers continue to contribute to co-curricular activities as well as community service works.

The Department of Architecture offers undergraduate degrees through a five-year curriculum of Bachelor of Architecture program.

Postgraduate Programs in Disaster Management, PPDM

The Department of Architecture at Brac University is the pioneer in running a postgraduate program in disaster management in the region. PPDM started in 2005 with a view to create qualified professionals in this nationally and internationally significant field. PPDM has both degree and certificate courses with 60 Master's degree holders and over one hundred certificate degree holders to its credit so far. PPDM

collaborates with other internationally important organizations in various workshops, training, seminars, conferences.

Interior Design Program

School of Architecture and Design launched its Certificate Program in Interior Design in Fall 2019. Faculty members include senior faculty from the Department of Architecture as well as well-known architects and interior designers of the country. Students who have Bachelor's degrees in various undergraduate programs are selected on the basis of their creative portfolios and interviews.

International internship opportunities

The Department of Architecture arranges internships for students in international along with national architectural firms. In 2019, students obtained practical training in several European and Asian countries. Some of the key names providing internship opportunities in 2019 included Vastu Shilpa Consultants, India.

Facts and Figures:

In 2019, a total of 1053 students got enrolled into the two CSE undergraduate programs - BSc in CS and BSc in CSE. 26 students got admitted in these postgraduate programs -MSc in CSE, MEngg in CSE and MCA. A total of 649 graduates from the undergraduate and postgraduate programs attended the 13th Convocation of BracU.

Faculty Overview:

The CSE department consists of 65 full-time faculty members, 13 of whom have PhD degrees. The department also had 25 contractual faculty members in Fall 2019. Professor Mahbub Majumdar was appointed as the Chairperson of CSE, effective from August 1, 2019. He is additionally serving as Interim Dean of the School of Sciences, effective from November 1, 2019. Professor Majumdar received his undergraduate degree from MIT, his MS from Stanford, and his PhD from Cambridge. Prior to this appointment, he has already been working as a full-time faculty member in the CSE department. Sadia Hamid Kazi, Assistant Professor, started serving as Deputy Chairperson in the department from August 1, 2019. Professor Arshad M. Chowdhury, PhD was named the inaugural Dean of the School of Engineering and Computer Science, effective from September 1, 2019. Professor Chowdhury completed his PhD in Electrical and Computer Engineering from Georgia Institute of Technology, USA. He is the co-inventor of 15 granted US patents and has published more than 95 peer-reviewed journal articles and conference papers. Professor Chowdhury previously served as Dean of its School of Engineering and Physical Sciences from 2017 to 2019 at North South University. Details of other faculty members may be viewed on the website.

As part of building the sense of ownership among the faculty members, Professor Majumdar spearheaded the introduction of subtle but effective changes from the first day of his

appointment. During the past year, the CSE department empowered course coordinators to enhance the teaching qualities and share different teaching techniques among the faculty members. Question moderation system and uniform marking scheme for the semester examinations were also introduced. To ensure easy communication between all stakeholders of the department 'Slack' was introduced. The department hired ample TA's and contractual faculty members to make lab experience better for students. For graduate programs, the department collaborated with industrial partners such as Robi to help their employees to enroll in M.Sc programs and continue their higher education. The department also provided scholarships to junior faculty members to encourage them to complete their master's degree.

Department of Economics and Social Sciences

The vision of the department is to create graduates, with a thorough knowledge and understanding of their respective academic discipline, who will become future leaders and thinkers locally and globally and its mission is to provide students with a fully rounded and comprehensive, yet demanding and innovative degree that will instill the requisite knowledge, skills and tools needed to enable them to achieve their career and academic aims.

Founded in 2003, ESS faculty members and students have remained engaged in enhancing understanding of economic and social realities, both in Bangladesh and the globalized world, and to develop critical insights and analysis to help determine solutions. From October 2019, the existing collaboration with the Department of English and Humanities (ENH) was strengthened, as ESS, along with ENH, became part of the School of Humanities and Social Sciences.

- 2. Leadership: Other than the role of chairperson, Professor ATM Nurul Amin, three Program Coordinators Professor Wasiqur Rahman Khan (Economics), Dr. Seuty Sabur (Anthropology), and Dr. Salma Begum (MS in Applied Economics) Dr. Samia Huq, Associate Professor of Anthropology Program was appointed for a higher level leadership role as Director of General Education, and Interim Dean of the School of Humanities and Social Sciences.
- **3. Academic Program(s):** Currently ESS offers three academic programs: *BSS in Economics, BSS in Anthropology, MS in Applied Economics*. Besides, it offers three minors in Economics, Anthropology and Sociology.

4. Achievements

For the first time since establishment, a review of the BSS in Economics curriculum was completed. Revisions and updates of course contents for the BSS and Master's Economics courses and Anthropology courses were carried out by respective faculty members. MS in Applied Economics has been fully revived, and a dedicated master's program coordinator has been appointed.

The 13th convocation saw the graduation of 151 students.

Department of Electrical and Electronic Engineering

About the Department:

The Department of Electrical and Electronic Engineering (EEE) possesses well-trained faculty members and researchers along with modern laboratory facilities. The department focuses on imparting practical engineering knowledge to the students and constant laboratory developments and renovations. The department actively encourages its undergraduate and graduate students to engage themselves in research and the esteemed faculties provide supervision and guidance at every stage.

The vision of our department is to be the leading department of Electrical and Electronic Engineering in the region with global recognition through excellence in teaching, research and technological innovation. In order to reach there, the department has formulated three missions:

- Create globally competent recognized professionals with broad critical thinking spectrum by providing world-class education to the students in a dynamic and inter-active learning environment.
- Enhance students' skills with state-of-theart laboratory facilities and highly competent faculty members so that they can work at the frontier of cutting-edge technology while displaying highest ethical and human values in all aspects of their lives.
- Foster inter-disciplinary research and university-industry partnership in order to provide sustainable solutions to the complex engineering problems faced by the society and industry, thereby contributing to nation building.

Leadership:

and young women's agency". Funded by the British Academy under its Youth Futures Grant, ENH researchers are working on this project under an MOU with BIGD, where they will contribute with their expertise on gender and language.

The senior faculty have well-established international reputations, and the mid-range faculty members are also well on their way to contributing in national and international academic arenas. Vision

To be a leader in education and research through innovation and excellence in pharmacy and pharmaceutical sciences.

Mission

To develop highly competent pharmacy graduates who will lead innovations in academia, industry, and healthcare in both local and global settings.

Academic Program

PHR started in 2010 and offers the Bachelor of Pharmacy (B. Pharm.) honors degree, which is a four-year integrated course divided into eight consecutive semesters and accredited by Bangladesh Pharmacy Council. The department consists of six modern laboratories to demonstrate laboratory work and conduct high-level research.

Achievements

a. Department Activities

Developing projects over two decades, BRAC IED has become a leading resource for ECD and play pedagogy in Bangladesh and has earned a global recognition. Over time, BRAC IED has built a portfolio of collaborations with local and international leading experts and partners in the fields of ECD, children's learning and mental health support.

Vision

A world where all children grow up with dignity.

Mission

Create innovative solutions for children to become engaged, empathetic, and empowered individuals.

Leadership

BRAC IED is led by a group of individuals who have contributed immensely to the field in technical areas through ground implementation and in research. The ability of the team to have the biggest impact in focus areas, to be able to collect those evidences, and to create innovative solutions by drawing on the learning from academia is what drives BRAC IED's evidence-based work. The faculty and staff of BRAC IED work collaboratively incorporating programs, research, teaching and learning and the team leaders each contribute their expertise into shaping rigorous programs and

processes to build a robust evidence-based portfolio. In addition to teaching, faculty members contribute to different research studies conducted by the Institute. Faculty members also introduced blended pedagogy to support the needs of the Teach for Bangladesh fellows based in Chattogram.

Academic Programs

BRAC IED administers masters and post-graduate programs in Educational Leadership and School Improvement and Early Childhood Development. The academic programs offered at the Institute are grounded, contextualized and experiential with integrated field learning opportunities. BRAC IED's programs are open for collaboration with various NGOs, INGOs and individuals to provide capacity development opportunities for professionals.

2019 Achievements

In 2019, BRAC IED successfully continued working towards its objectives both through its academic programs and its projects. Working alongside many local and international consultants and partnerships, the Institute has undertaken important projects and model development activities on play, early childhood, mental health and humanitarian works. Projects of 2019 include:

- Play Labs- funded by Porticus, this is designed for the development of playbased ECD in Bangladesh incorporating BRAC's Play Lab curriculum into the preprimary education system of government primary schools (GPS).
- Play to Learn- funded by the LEGO
 Foundation, this is the Humanitarian Play
 Lab (HPL) intervention for ECD and is
 developed to serve children between the age
 of 0 to 6 within the Rohingya community in
 Cox's Bazar. The Play to Learn project is in
 partnership with Sesame Workshop and
 IRC. It aims to develop play-based learning

opportunities and provide mental health support for the, approximately, 47,000 people in the Rohingya community.

- Play Accelerator- funded by the LEGO
 Foundation, is designed to develop GPS
 teachers' capacity on play-based pedagogy.
 The opportunity to work with the
 government to further develop its programs
 has always been a long-term goal of BRAC
 IED's and a major accomplishment resulting
 from many successful projects and
 partnerships led by the Institute's faculty and
 staff over the years.
- The Yidan Prize for Education Development awarded to founder Sir Fazle Hasan Abed, KCMG. On receiving the award, Sir Abed emphasized on how the prize will help advance his long-term goal of developing early childhood learning and socially and emotionally intelligent people. In his acceptance speech for the Yidan Prize, Sir Abed acknowledged BRAC IED's work with play-based learning and looked to the future for the continuation of investments in existing programs. The Yidan project, funded by the Yidan Prize Foundation, focuses on expanding the HPL in Uganda and GPS in Tanzania, simultaneously developing the Play Lab Childcare model in Bangladesh.

Postgraduate programs offered at BRAC IED are the largest in BracU. In 2019, 55 students successfully finished MEd or MSc programs and five students completed PGD programs. Four students achieved CGPA 4.0 and two of them were honored with Vice Chancellor's Gold Medal. 30 students achieved CGPA 3.5 and above.

BIGD is also a centre of excellence in post-graduate education.

Leadership

Dr. Imran Matin, Executive Director of BIGD, has been leading the institute to become a globally-recognized centre for rigorous research on policy and development interventions. Dr. Matin has deep expertise on research for development. Previously he worked as the Chief Policy and Research Officer of Innovations for Poverty Action (IPA), International Program Director of Save the Children International, Director of the Africa Program of BRAC International, and Director of BRAC's Research and Evaluation Division. He is a Visiting Fellow of the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE). Dr. Matin has a PhD in Economics from the University of Sussex.

Academic Programs

- Master of Development Studies (MDS): BIGD is one of the pioneers in offering the MDS degree in Bangladesh. MDS is a multidisciplinary, praxis-focused program that has an equal emphasis on developing a strong theoretical understanding, learning from the real world, and building practical skills of the students.
- Master of Arts in Governance and Development (MAGD): MAGD is an internationally-acclaimed, fully-funded and highly selective one-year residential postgraduate degree program, designed for public and government officials from South Asia.

 Masters in Procurement and Supply Management (MPSM): MPSM is a specialised program that develops highly competent procurement and supply chain management professionals of international standards.

Achievements (2019)

Significant achievements of the institute

- In 2019, BIGD was awarded USD six million by Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to develop and manage an international grantmaking facility for rigorous research on women's economic empowerment and digital finance (WEE-DiFine). It is a rare and significant achievement for any southern research institute, which reflects its international reputation and credibility for rigorous research in social science.
- In 2019, BIGD developed a significant research portfolio closely aligned with the achievement of SDG 1, including the impact evaluation of BRAC's newly-modified Ultra-Poor Graduation program. With about 40,000 sample households, it is one of the largest impact evaluations in the country.

Students' Success Stories

 Four students from the MDS & MPSM programs, and one student from the MAGD program received the Vice-Chancellor's Gold Medal during the BracU 13th Convocation, 2019.


Brac Institute of Languages

About

The journey of Brac Institute of Language (BIL) began in 2006 as the English Language Program (EL-Pro). Since then, BIL restructured itself twice to finally become the Institute it is today. A product of the aspirations, vision, dedication and innovation of its pioneer and Senior Director, Lady Syeda Sarwat Abed and her team, the Institute has attained substantial achievements teaching English language courses to the undergraduate students, academic English to graduate students, TESOL (Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages) to professionals and foreign languages to learners from various backgrounds.

BIL aims to assist students to develop the language skills they need to be successful in graduate school and in their professional lives. The institute focuses on implementing student-centred, creative language teaching techniques by developing modules based on students' proficiency levels. Additionally, BIL is committed to the field of academic language teaching and research, with a clear focus on creative and forward-thinking teaching methodology for diverse learner groups.

Leadership



Academic Program(s)

BIL offers five English language courses, ranging from intermediate to advanced level of language proficiency for the undergraduate students of BracU, two modern language credit courses (Chinese and French), a unique Pre-University course, and evening session modern language courses that include Chinese, French Bangla, German, Spanish, and Arabic. The Institute also offers an M.A. program in TESOL. Additionally, BIL offers two specialized courses - English for Academic Purposes (EAP) and English Proficiency Development Course (EPDC).

Achievements of 2019

- Md Mamunur Rashid, Lecturer, BIL received the 'Excellence in Education Award' in the 20th CTAUN Conference at the United Nations (UN) on April 5, 2019, for his project titled, Shaping the Youth with Empathy Education.
- BIL faculty member Md. Shams Ud Duha, who is currently pursuing his PhD in the US, has been elected as a Graduate Student Representative for the Teacher Education Division of the Association of Educational Communications and Technology (AECT). He went on to become a global ambassador for Purdue's graduate school.
- Farid Ahmed, Lecturer of BIL, participated in an exchange program offered by U.S. Department of State from October 21 to November 1, 2019. He also attended the 50th anniversary celebration of the English Language Fellow Program held in Washington DC from November 3 - 5, 2019.
- Abdullah Al Mamun successfully completed his obligations as Fulbright Scholarship recipient [FLTA, University of Michigan (2018- 2019)] and resumed his teaching position in Summer 2019.
- On 8 January, 2019, Mohammad Aminul Islam, Md. Abu Sufian, Md. Mahbubul Islam and Moshiur Rahman of BIL conducted 'Teaching English Language' sessions as

part of the Faculty Development Training for the faculty members of Midwifery Program under Brac James P. Grant School of Public Health (JPGSPH) of BracU.

- BIL has formed a collaboration with the Developing Midwives Project (DMP). BIL representatives monitored the classes of English teachers, facilitated teacher training where necessary and administered a modular English examination in November, 2019. BIL will continue working in this collaboration with the consultants of University of Auckland for the faculty development program of DMP project.
- BIL designed and conducted a 12-week English language course for the MAGD program. The course, titled GOV 690: Basic Course in English, has been designed to enhance participants' existing knowledge in English and help develop the four basic language skills of reading, writing, speaking and listening.
- An Online Learning Unit has been launched in BIL. From May to October, 2019, the unit worked jointly with Health21 to develop an online course on "Effective Behavioural Communication for Doctor-Patient Relationship". The course was launched on 12 October, 2019. Currently, the unit is developing two Bangla courses, "Online Bangla I" and 'Online Bangla II" for foreign learners.
- BIL conducted a 72-hour long course titled Interpersonal Communication Skills Training for the operation staff of Brac Institute of Governance and Development (BIGD) in Fall, 2019.
- Bangladesh Computer Council is in communication with BIL for developing the communicative skills of around 200 of their field staff. The level assessment test for this project has already been conducted.
- In May, 2019, BIL donated more than 350 books to Shimantik and FIVDB (Friends in Village Development Bangladesh), two prominent non-governmental organizations in Sylhet. In December, BIL donated another

120 books to the "Development Midwifery Project" in the premise of the GBC Christian Health Project, Haluaghat, Mymensingh. These donations were organized under a Book Drive Project titled "Harnessing Emerging Readers for Attainment and Language Development" (HERALD).

Research Activities, Grants and Awards

A total of 10 articles were published by BIL faculty members in 2019 in SCOPUS indexed journals. Moreover, a team of BIL faculty members are collaborating on a book titled *Reshaping Tertiary Level English Teaching & Learning Experiences*.

Faculty Overview

BIL has 58 full-time and 3 adjunct faculty members. Five of the faculty members are on study leave pursuing their PhDs. Additionally, 10 more faculty members are pursuing Post-graduate studies.

The English for Professional Development Course (EPDC) had 60 students and the course English for Academic Purposes (EAP) had 77 students. The evening session modern language courses offered in 2019 were Chinese, with 121 students, French, with 16 students, Spanish with 19 students and German with 29 students. In 2019, 26 students enrolled for the MA in TESOL program. Currently the program has 53 students.



Centre for Climate Change and Environmental Research (C3ER)



ABOUT

C3ER, the Centre for Climate Change and Environmental Research was established in the year 2011. Since its inception, BracU has conducted a series of cross-sectoral research on climate change and disaster management in direct collaboration with BRAC. To coordinate and manage these different activities, the Syndicate and the Board of Trustees of Brac University have accorded for the establishment of a research centre titled "Centre for Climate Change and Environmental Research (C3ER)". The Centre establishes a synergy between BracU and BRAC in the field of climate change and other environmental issues.

TRAINING AND ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

In 2019, C3ER conducted a series of Training Programs on different aspects of climate change and environment such as "Integration of Climate Change Issues into the Development Planning in Bangladesh"; "Climate Change & Resilient Urban Development''; "Climate and Disaster Risk Financing in Bangladesh: Best Practices and

Knowledge Sharing"; "Climate Change, Gender, and Project Governance" and "Proposal Development".

Centre for Entrepreneurship Development (CED)

Overview

To make significant contribution in creating an inclusive entrepreneurial ecosystem in Bangladesh, Centre for Entrepreneurship Development (CED) of BracU [hereinafter CED-BracU] started its journey in April 2011 with the view to encouraging Bangladeshi entrepreneurs through enriching entrepreneurial knowledge and skill so that the entrepreneurs can systematically develop and grow their own businesses. CED-BracU works for engaging potential Bangladeshi entrepreneurs in innovative thinking and provides a platform for new and existing enterprises, be it micro, small, or medium, through skills acquisition activities for the development and management of the enterprise. To understand the enterprise better, CED-BracU emphasizes on research that will contribute to entrepreneurial development in Bangladesh, advance education and skill acquisition along this line, and popularize the idea of entrepreneurship.

Vision

To make significant contribution in creating an inclusive entrepreneurial ecosystem in Bangladesh

Mission

- To inspire, devise, nurture, develop, and elevate entrepreneurship through innovation, institutional capacity, and leadership.
- To unlock the potential of young entrepreneurs in Bangladesh

Goals and Objectives

With the motto of "helping people help themselves", the goal of CED-BracU is to encourage entrepreneurship and engender entrepreneurial knowledge and skills through innovation, capacity development and leadership. The key objectives of CED-BracU are as follows:

- To promote the idea of entrepreneurship in Bangladesh
- To help build capabilities of the entrepreneurs
- To address the knowledge gaps and skill shortcomings that prevent entrepreneurs (in various sectors) from growing their businesses and run them effectively
- To develop academic curricula and introduce courses targeting entrepreneurs and students, who wish to pursue an entrepreneurial path
- To engage and collaborate with organizations which may include educational institutions for improving the entrepreneurial ventures of local and foreign entrepreneurs

Activities (January to December 2019)

Major activities of CED-BracU in 2019 include:

- Conducting nation-wide census/survey to collect data on export-oriented RMG factories under the flagship project titled "Mapped in Bangladesh" (MiB) (formerly DRFM-B) [www.mappedinbangladesh.org].
- Developing the digital map of RMG factories with in-house resources.
- Working with GIZ for SSREU project ("Support to Safety Retrofits and Environmental Upgrades in the Bangladeshi Ready-Made Garment Sector") and providing necessary support to GIZ as an incountry partner.
- Conducted a 2-day workshop titled "Marketing for Startups" for BracU students who were participating in the business plan competition arranged by CED on in January 2019.
- Became associated with the UNESCO Chair on "Responsible Foresight for Sustainable Development" in the Lincoln International Business School at the University of Lincoln in March 2019, with the objective to

- empower and encourage human and social agency.
- Organized a 2-day long training on "Effective Project Management" for the staff of CED and MiB project May 2019 at Brac Centre for Development and Management (BCDM) at Savar.
- Distributed BDT 19 Lac to 6 incubatee groups of student-led startups who went through the Business Plan Competition (BPC) (held in 2018), and they got awarded in July 2019.
- Launched a 360-degree entrepreneurship development program TRIUMPH in July 2019, along with the 5th Round of Business Plan Competition (BPC).
- Organized the final presentation session of Business Plan Competition 2019 (BPC Round 5) on January 2, 2020, eleven (11) groups presented their business propositions in the final round, four (4) were announced as the winners of BPC (Round 5) and as qualifiers for enrolling to the Business Incubation Centre (BIC).
- Currently, ten (10) BracU graduates have been working with CED in different projects, and also through the Startups, around 50 students are working in BIC as part/full-time, which is providing them with hands-on working experience.
- The BPC attracted a record number of more than 120 aspiring entrepreneurs (i.e. BracU students) and they participated in 37 groups in 2019.
- Developed a 12-week training program for the aspiring entrepreneurs of BracU based on MIT's "Disciplined Entrepreneurship".
- Organized twenty-four (24) different sessions on "Disciplined Entrepreneurship" as a part of the TRIUMPH programme.
- Inaugurated a mentorship program and provided total 13 sessions to five (5) incubatee groups with different professionals and organizations as per the requirement of the incubatees.

- Provided business incubation and mentoring support to over 250 students by BIC through the mentorship program in 2019.
- Provided Amazon Web Services (AWS) to two (2) start-ups of BIC with AWS Activate Organization's \$1000 for one-year promotional credits so that these start-ups receive online services of Amazon as per their needs free of cost.
- Organized a regional convening in Narayanganj for the MiB project, jointly organized with Bangladesh Knitwear Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BKMEA) in July 2019.
- Organized a regional convening in Chattogram for the MiB project, jointly organized with Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA) in October 2019.
- Joined Core Talk, the first web series in Bangladesh on entrepreneurship in October 2019, and partnered with CORE Global, to develop an eco-system for young entrepreneurs and innovation in the Bangladeshi context.
- Joined Climathon 2019 titled "Climathon: Cities. Hacking. Solutions." on the Global Climathon Day (October 25, 2019), a solutions-hackathon aimed to tackle global climate challenges, a year-round program.
- Continue running its full-fledged universitybased BIC with 13 incubatee groups consisting of 55 students and alumni who are enrolled to BIC and receiving incubation support and services.

Departmental Leadership

At the organizational level within BracU's framework, CED-BracU is currently headed by an Adviser, and run by a Deputy Director. Faculty members and academics from other Departments and Schools, as well as other resource personnel from BracU are also committed on a project-by-project basis as and when required.

Centre for Peace and Justice (CPJ)



The Centre for Peace and Justice (CPJ) is a multi-disciplinary academic institute, which promotes global peace and social justice through quality education, research, training and advocacy. CPJ is committed to identifying and promoting sustainable and inclusive solutions to a wide range of global concerns and issues, including fragility, conflict and violence. The centre was established in March 2017 and joined the rank of other institutes and centres of BracU. Under the leadership of its Executive Director, Barrister Manzoor Hasan *OBE*, the centre has already achieved vast research, training and advocacy experiences in its three thematic areas (1) Peace and Fragility (2) Social Justice, and (3) Open Society.

CPJ has also worked with various UN agencies, like UNDP, UN WOMEN, IOM, UNHCR, WFP, and with donors including Open Society Foundation (OSF), The Asia Foundation (TAF), DFID, USAID and Amnesty International, among others. CPJ is a founding member of the Asia Justice Coalition, which is chaired by its Executive Director.

The Conclave was hosted in The Hague, The Netherlands by ISS of Erasmus University Rotterdam.
- National Colloquium on Empowering Young Women: Promoting Peaceful, Cohesive and Prosperous Bangladesh was organized in March 2019 as part of the closure event of 'Empowered Women, Peaceful Communities' project funded by UN WOMEN. It was a sharing event where participants, beneficiaries and stakeholders

- of the project shared their experience and learning with academics, researchers, development professionals from home and abroad, and students studying at various universities.
- Established two Women Peace Pace Café at Begum Rokeya University, Rangpur and Jatiya Kabi Kazi Nazrul Islam University, Mymensingh to promote peace and social cohesion among young students. In 2018, CPJ trained 320 female students on Entrepreneurship for Peace building and Social Cohesion who are working as WPC members in the university campus.
- A two-day regional research 'writeshop' on Access to Justice in Asia was held on March 13 to 14, 2019 at Bangkok. The research 'writeshop' was supported by Konrad Adenaur Foundation, Singapore. The twoday 'writeshop' brought together 12 authors to build a regional body of knowledge on legal empowerment and access to justice in Asia. The 'writeshop' was facilitated by Dr. Caroline Brassard, academic advisor of CPJ.
- Graduation Ceremony of Youth Volunteers for Peace and Civic Learning in Cox's Bazar. CPJ organized a Graduation Ceremony at TAI Community Centre in Kutupalong Registered Refugee Camp, Ukhiya, and Cox's Bazar October 31, 2019 to mark the end of the Community-Based Learning for Peace Project (CBLP) and Civic Outreach Projects (COP) funded by MSI-USAID.

Center for Inclusive Architecture and Urbanism (Ci+AU)

Centre for Inclusive Architecture and Urbanism (Ci+AU) is a multidisciplinary research institute and offers research-based consultancy on urban issues the exploration of conditions, processes, and policies that affect the livability, resilience, and sustainability of the built environment. The Centre's mission is to create a dynamic culture of architecture and urbanism that is inclusive, empathetic, environmentally conscious, and humanistic.

By integrating rigorous research with applied consultations, Ci+AU seeks to engender a system of bottom-up thinking about how to build inclusive environments and livable cities. The Centre's collaborative and action-based research activities contribute to the development of new knowledge and offer innovative design solutions and policy guidance for both the public and private sectors. It serves policy- and decision-makers, professional agencies and organizations, development agencies, stakeholders in urban development, and academia, with a view to creating a platform for critical thinking around community-driven architecture and urbanism in the Global South and beyond.

Leadership

Founded by Professor Adnan Zillur Morshed, BracU, Dhaka, and Catholic University of America, Washington, DC in 2017, the Centre's current advisory board includes Professor Mark Jarzombek, Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), Professor Rahul Mehrotra, Harvard University, Professor Haider A. Khan, University of Denver, Professor Howard Davis, University of Oregon, Professor Firdous Azim, BracU, and Professor Syed Saad Andaleeb, Penn State University. Sir Fazle Hasan Abed, KCMG, Founder of BRAC and BracU, was also an integral member of the centre's inaugural Board of Directors.

Academic Program(s)

The Centre is a multi-tiered collaborative for the study of architecture and urbanism by bringing together a multi-disciplinary group of educators, researchers, policymakers, urban administrators, students, and practitioners. It will:

- provide a platform to inquire into the critical issues that affect, influence, and condition the production of the built environment
- encourage and promote scholarly research on urban and environmental issues
- disseminate innovative ideas on peoplecentered urbanism to other researchers, agencies, and organizations interested in the built environment
- improve communication between researchers, practitioners, and urban stakeholders
- offer consultancy service to both public and private sector clients intending to serve the urban population of all economic strata
- collaborate with all urban stakeholders to create livable cities and sustainable living conditions
- organize capacity-building programs to empower urban administrators and stakeholders
- host local and international researchers interested in urban and environmental issues

Furthermore, Ci+AU has created a Visiting Scholar Program to offer researchers from around the world the opportunity to collaborate with our team on short-term projects. This program aims to generate new ideas and scholarships on a range of subjects including urban design, architecture, environmental management and ethics, and social history. By inviting foreign scholars to engage with our dedicated staff of architects, designers and urbanists, the program hopes to facilitate the meaningful cross-fertilisation of ideas and build a dynamic environment to promote new research.

 Ci+AU has completed the design consultancy for BRAC Construction to design eight BRAC Regional Offices across Bangladesh. All eight offices have been constructed.

- Ci+AU has completed the design proposal for Aarong Earth, a prototype display center for Aarong's herbal products to be used in all Aarong outlets.
- Ci+AU has undertaken a research project to study toilet hygiene among rural adolescent school girls and to build a prototype toilet in Jhalokati, Barishal. The project was implemented in December 2019.
- Ci+AU has designed a low-cost children's school for Rohingya children in Cox's Bazar.

Ci+AU has undertaken a research project to study the feasibility of transforming Dhaka's flyovers into multiuse infrastructures. Grant Application:

Commonwealth Foundation Grant, 200,000 British Pound (2019, result pending) Partnering with JPG School of Public Health, Ci+AU proposed a costefficient and sanitary toilet for adolescent female students to improve their menstrual hygiene, which will transform the idea of a toilet from a negative and socially stigmatized space to a positive and community-driven facility. It will change the attitude of adolescent boys, parents, and teachers regarding the specific health needs of girls. Furthermore, a gender-friendly toilet helps improve the self-esteem of girls, empowering them to be productive citizens.

Professional Development Centre (PDC)

The Professional Development Centre (PDC) is an innovation of Brac University dedicated to promoting excellence in education through shared understanding and best practice. The centre was previously known as the Teaching & Learning Centre, opened in 2006. PDC strives to build a creative environment of pedagogical development and research that fosters innovation across the university in collaboration with faculty and administrative staff. The focus of the centre is to keep the campus community updated with pedagogical developments, coordinate academic resources, support professional development and contribute to successful student learning. From group events to personalized attention, the PDC supports measurable effectiveness in faculty development, course instruction and assessment, scholarly research, and innovation in education technologies. Our expanding activities and services include orientations, workshops and seminars, individual consultations, pedagogical research, teaching courses and program design.

Vision

PDC will be a dynamic platform for promoting best teaching/learning practices, effective educational leadership and management, and inclusion and social justice in higher educational institutions of Bangladesh, South Asia, and beyond. The centre will develop processes by which both local and global experiences of academic and professional development are explored. Simultaneously, it will facilitate research-informed, sustainable and

innovative professional development schemes for pre- and in-service academic and administrative staff of higher educational institutions. Whereas university academics will be the primary beneficiaries of the centre, the greater stakeholder community will include students, management staff and anyone interested in education industries.

Mission

The core mission of the centre is to assist Brac University and other local higher educational institutions in evaluating and embracing effective modes of teaching practices that deliver excellent educational experience to students. The centre works with academics across disciplines in designing and re-designing academic programmes through realistic considerations of content, pedagogy, assessment, student management, mentorship and supervision, and impact/target review. The issues related to diversity, learner autonomy and voice along with the transferability of learning to workplaces, people and society are also the priorities of the centre. The Office of the Vice Chancellor is the executive wing of Brac University, and functions as the management oversight body for all administrative, academic and support services throughout the university. This Office is responsible for the strategic management of institutional operations and for providing guidelines for tactical solutions. The Office of the Vice Chancellor coordinates with academic heads and office managers to ensure efficiency of operations and also provides leadership for future directions. The Office is

responsible for carrying out the institutional mission and for fulfilling the institutional vision. The Office of the Vice Chancellor formulates policies, provides guidelines and resources for implementation, and ensures evaluative measures. The executives in this office are the Vice-Chancellor, the Pro-Vice Chancellor, the Treasurer, Vice President, International, and Vice President, Administration, Chief of Staff, and Advisor for Business and Executive Programs.

Ayesha Abed Library

The Ayesha Abed Library at BracU aims to become a world-class knowledge resource centre and provide innovative services and collections to support academic and research activities of the university community.

In 2019, Ayesha Abed Library continued to strengthen and expand its collections and its services by purchasing and subscribing to print and electronic resources and to develop and maintain the required technical infrastructure for accessing these resources. Patterns of enquiries has been changed with an increase in electronic queries and use of social media, where postings can serve as a forum for feedback and questions. A departmental library has been setup in the Architecture Department and a new librarian recruited. A proposal for BracU library floor plan for new campus along with a plan for establishing a Digital Scholarship and Innovation Lab was prepared and submitted by the librarian.

Library Highlights of 2019

Collection Development

The library was able to extend the range and depth of the collection by subscribing to thousands of e-journals and databases through two Consortium - UGC Digital Library (UDL) and Library Consortium of Bangladesh (LiCoB), previously (INASP/ PERII Consortium).

- 2757 printed books were added to the main collection.
- Library continued to subscribe more than 56000 online journals and databases.
- Economic & Political Weekly has been added to this new collection.
- 1213 number of documents (Theses, Dissertation, Internship Report, Annual Report etc) were added into Dspace (http://dspace.bracu.ac.bd).
- A collection page for BRAC Research and Evaluation (RED) Archive has been incorporated into BracU Institutional Repository. A total of 601 documents including 151 Economic Studies, 231 Health

Studies, 191 Social Studies and 15 other documents were received, scanned and archived in the BracU Institutional Repository.

- The expenditure related to Printed Books were Taka 50,65,010/
- The expenditure related to Online Journals and Databases, eBooks, OpenAthens and Turnitin Taka 2,593,329/-

Library Technology and Systems

During the year we continued to manage, upgrade and maintain the Integrated Library Management System (ILS) Koha, Institutional Repository (Dspace), Library Discovery Tool (EDS & VuFind), Library Website (Drupal CMS) and library mobile interface. We also explored and developed technology solutions to support library users. Some highlights are given below:

- Developed a Thesis and Internship Report Template for undergraduate and master's program students.
- Maintained network of Library Learning Resource Centre and other Workstations of the library.
- Created the technical documentations and on-demand report generation when necessary from the ILS.
- Maintained OpenAthens remote access facilities and anti-plagiarism web tool, Turnitin.
- Updated Institutional Repository System from DSpace 5.3 to 6.3 for better performance and UI design.
- Initiated new website for the library.

Trainings and Workshops Conducted

Research Skills Workshop

The library conducted 17 basic and customized research-skills workshops (information literacy) for both students and faculty members. The workshop aimed to help familiarize the students with the library resources and its mechanisms, research tools, reference management tools and techniques

and codes of avoiding academic misconduct and other academic research conduct.

Author Workshop on Plagiarism Detection Tool: Turnitin

Ayesha Abed Library in collaboration with TurnitIndia Education organized an author workshop on *Plagiarism Detection Tool: Turnitin* for faculty members and researchers on February 10 and 13, 2019 respectively.

Akshay Prasanna from TurnitIndia Education Pvt. Ltd was the facilitator of the workshop. Mr. Prasanna showed how to use Turnitin more effectively, what is similarity Index, how can one prevent plagiarism by knowing similarity, why Turnitin similarity check report, how to give a more accurate report, what is plagiarism and what are its effect on Institution. A good number of faculty members and researchers of BracU attended the workshop.

Counseling Centre

Brief Overview of Counseling Unit

The mission of the Counseling Unit is to offer professional mental health services to assist in overcoming life's challenges and moving towards positive changes. The counselors are committed to fostering a non-threatening and non-judgmental environment in which strict confidentiality and ethical guidelines are maintained and individual and cultural differences are respected.

The activities of the unit are run by a team of skilled psychosocial counselors and Dr. Mehtab Khanam working as Clinical Supervisor. The team is led by Kara Fraser, Director of Campus Life.

Activities and achievements:

The team provides a wide range of support services and educational programs both at the Mohakhali and Savar Campus.

Psychological Counseling Service:

The Counseling Unit offers individual, group, couple and family counselling sessions to students and parents, as well as to the faculty members and staff of BracU. In 2019, the unit provided individual counseling services to around 600 students with about 2000 sessions conducted, most of which were self-referred, while the rest were referred to by the BracU faculty members and authority. The unit also arranged several group counseling sessions and family counseling sessions.

Workshop, Training, Seminar Conducted:

In 2019, the Counseling Unit launched the Peer Support Program to develop a support system within the students to promote individual and collective wellbeing with a higher sense of selfawareness and life skills. Moreover, several programs were organized on yoga and meditation such as 'Yoga and Meditation Retreat', and 'Weekly sessions from Yoga and Meditation Society' to connect with inner self, manage stress, and improve physical and mental wellbeing. The unit also reached out to other stakeholders of the university community through counseling sessions, educational programs and workshops (e.g. "Mental Health Services at BracU and student referral process", and "Greif process and healing") for members of the faculty and administration at BracU.

The Unit organized a seminar on Parenting to promote mutual respect, empathetic understanding in parent-child relationships. The Unit members also facilitated seminars on Awareness on Drug Dependency at the Residential Campus to educate youth about the negative consequences of abusing drugs. The Counseling Unit observed this year's World Mental Health Day with a Round-Table discussion on Promoting Mental Health Wellbeing of Young Adults where several mental health professionals, faculty members and other stakeholders of different academic and health institutions were present to enrich the discussion.



Community Service:

In 2019, in collaboration with Centre for Emotional Intelligence and Innovation, the Counseling Unit visited several schools across Dhaka and other districts to give talks and conduct workshops on empathy, parenting, self-awareness and other psychosocial issues.

Background

The Internal Audit & Compliance Department (IA&CD) provides independent, objective assurance and consultation services designed to add value and improve the operations of the university. IA&CD helps the university accomplish its objectives by bringing a systematic, disciplined approach to evaluate and improve the effectiveness of governance, risk management and internal control processes.

IA&CD plays an important role in the assessment of university's compliance with applicable laws, regulations and contracts to ensure that the management addresses these requirements adequately.

Responsibility

The responsibility of IA&CD includes:

Examination of transactions and events for accuracy, integrity and reliability

- Supervision to ensure that BracU is carrying out its academic, research, administrative, financial and other activities in full compliance with the policies, procedures, laws, and regulations of the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and the University Grants Commission of Bangladesh
- Evaluation of the means of safeguarding assets and, as appropriate, verifying the existence of such assets
- Investigation of significant suspected fraudulent activities within BracU as assigned by management and notifying management, as appropriate, of the results

Reporting

IA&CD typically issues reports at the end of each audit assignment and the report is distributed as per the instruction of the Senior Management.

Human Resources Department


The Human Resources Department is one of the core administrative departments at Brac University. It supports the aims of the university by recruiting talented individuals, supporting employee development and implementing robust HR processes that increase discretionary effort.

During 2019, HR played an integral role in supporting the recruitment of global talent by conducting a large number of searches in Bangladesh and internationally. Numerous advertising channels were utilized including the Times Higher Education, the Chronicle of Higher Education and by profiling the university at specialist conferences.


In total 233 new employees were recruited including 147 regular employees.

The faculty performance management process was revised to assess performance across a broader range of measures. This was largely successful and provides a solid foundation for further improvements in 2020.

HR staff was integrally involved in the planning and implementation of the SAP HCM system. Many current HRIS processes are manual and we hope that once SAP HCM is fully implemented there will be significant improvements in the operational efficiency and the creation of a reliable platform to provide additional HRIS functionality in the future



HR policies and procedures are being updated regularly to ensure the welfare of the employees and the university. We welcome new employees through an induction program with an overview of the organization and communicating the general expectations of the university to the new employees. HR continues to create a strong bond between employees and the university.



Information Technology Department

About the Department

The main focus of the Information and Technology (IT) department is to strive to provide quality support service within the shortest possible time for all information and technology related services as is required by students, faculty and staff, as well as to bring new innovations to gradually increase automated IT related services around the campus.

Key Achievements of the Previous Year -2019

The implementation of the first phase of Savar RS Wi-fi services were completed and commissioned, covering most of the campus. The second phase will be designed to implement full coverage of the Savar RS campus as per the request of the Savar authorities.

Due to the constant increase in the demand for accessing YouTube and Facebook, a new redundant fibre optic connectivity was introduced to improve connectivity and bandwidth speeds for Savar RS. The internet bandwidth has been enhanced to over 150 Mbps and also a tertiary 50 Mbps radio link has been connected to provide uninterrupted internet services, even when the fibre links are down.

Firewall installed with the USIS server cluster had proved to be very effective in relation to the intrusion detection and prevention and preventing such attacks as DDOS, malware, hacking, etc. USIS software is continuously being worked on to improve performance and efficiency, speed of execution, etc. and lately, the entire USIS software has been further streamlined to ensure more accuracy. IT looks forward to further update the USIS.

During 2019, StraVis Limited, an Indian company hired to implement the SAP S4/HANA for higher education, worked to implement and train support engineers and software developers. The first phase implementation of the SAP ERP software for the campus is complete and will be ready for commissioning by March, 2020.

The pre-registration sessions for the 2019 Spring, Summer and Fall semesters were successfully carried out making adjustments for the increased student enrolment. Notably, the highest number of on-line pre-registration to date was successfully completed in the Spring 2019 semester.

Connectivity to BdREN has been improved in terms of connectivity uptime, services and the stability of the network of BdREN.

On-line payment services have been implemented for Southeast Bank Ltd, One Bank Limited, Dhaka Bank, Brac Bank to make online payment and collection of tuition and other fees more convenient.

Technological logistic support was provided for the orientation programs for the 2019 Spring, Summer and Fall semesters. The logistics included up-to-date LED display panels, sound systems, videography, etc.

The entire technological logistic support for the 13th Convocation of BracU was organized and implemented by IT. LED screens and sound systems were installed to provide well-distributed sound and high quality video. Simultaneously, IT managed the live streaming in Facebook and YouTube of the entire program.

The DR (disaster recovery) site, hosted at the Intercloud Data Centre, has been providing seamless automatic failover transition during outages of the website and the USIS.

IT has completed the implemention of the CCTV security and surveillance network using IP camera and network devices that are connected to a central command and monitoring station. This system connects all 8 buildings of the Mohakhali campus.

Partial Wi-Fi coverage of places frequented by the students, like Prangon, Cafeteria, indoor games facility, auditorium, was completed so that students may have access to the network outside the computer labs.

Student gsuite accounts have been introduced and made mandatory for the students to be able to obtain the various services provided by the university, including access to learning materials through the newly purchased Moodle, an LMS platform services for the distribution of learning materials.

The BracU mobile app has been upgraded by the IT software department with new graphics and smoother operational features.

The negotiations related to the implementation of the IT LAN using CAT6A, optical fibre network, data centre requirements, cooling and backup power supply arrangements for the new campus were finalized with Strategic Data Governance, the Singapore IT Consultant, which coordinate with the Singapore-based consultant WOHA and BUCG, the primary construction company for the new campus.

Institutional Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The Institutional Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of BracU was established in July, 2015 in order to ensure quality education at the tertiary level. IQAC was established as a project for a period of 3 years with financial assistance from HEQEP, UGC and the World Bank. IQAC will become a permanent organ of the university after three years and its operations will be sustained and maintained under the revenue budget of the university.

General Objective

IQAC aims to promote a quality enhancement culture within the university by ensuring that the academic entity adopts and implements Quality Assurance (QA) standards and benchmarked quality criteria.

Specific Objectives of the IQAC

- Review existing policies and procedures of BracU
- Assess and strengthen capacity for effective governance, teaching-learning, research and community service
- Institutionalize quality assurance systems within the university
- Prepare the university to meet external quality assurance assessment and accreditation requirements


- Monitor and evaluate Self-Assessment (SA) practices and processes through audit, survey and other instruments
- Co-ordinate all QA related activities at the national level and liaise with UGC and other external QA agencies

The role of IQAC

The IQAC was set up following an administrative order of the university authority. It is organized in a manner which befits the size, existing structure and capacity of the university as delineated in the Act. The role of IQAC is to:

- support the university in achieving its vision of providing quality tertiary education
- function as a central quality assurance cell for the university and review existing standards and procedures
- develop new standards, policies, systems, processes and procedures by adopting and incorporating best practices
- systematically monitor and evaluate university practices and processes through audit, survey and other instruments as deemed fit to ensure generally acceptable standards of quality

Summary of IQAC Activities in 2019

- Provided training on newly designed Out-Come-Based (OBE) curriculum.
- Arranged workshop to update curriculum according to OBE for the programs: Physics, Applied Physics, Mathematics, Biotechnology, and Microbiology.
- Started Self-Assessment (SA) activities by forming Faculty Self-Assessment

Committee under the guidance of the Self-Assessment Committees (SAC) of three new departments: Anthropology, Brac Institute of Languages, and Mathematics. Self-Assessment (SA) activities of thirteen (13) programs have already been completed according to the Self-Assessment Manual of Higher Education Quality Enhancement Project (HEQEP).

Medical Centre



BracU Medical Center provides medical service to its students, faculty and staff. The Center is well equipped to provide the university community with emergency medical service, medical advice and necessary referrals. Both Medical Centers, in main campus at Mohakhali and in Residential Campus at Savar, have their own dedicated medical teams consisting of qualified and professional doctors and nurses. An overview of the function of the centres in 2019 is given below.

- A total of 17274 patients, 12933 students and 4341 faculty and staff members, visited the Medical Center at BracU main campus and Savar campus for various health problems. All were given necessary advice and prescription after their clinical evaluation.
- The most common disease treated was Respiratory Tract Infections (2486). Other diseases included Gastrointestinal (GIT) problems (2247), traumatic and burn injuries (1802), common cold and viral fever (1411), skin diseases (673), ear problem (597), gynecological problems (448), bronchial asthma (340), dental problem (299), eye problem (231) and hypertension (98). There were also 6313 other symptoms and diseases.
- A medical team gave first-aid training to 75 office assistants and 20 female security guards.
- The Medical Centre gave vaccines to 34 high risk people for Tetanus, Tig and Hepatitis-B.

- The Centre performed blood sugar tests for 235 people and blood grouping for 8 people.
- The Centre designed and posted various awareness posters pertaining to health issues and subsequent prevention measures. The issues included personal hygiene, bronchial asthma, dengue fever, conjunctivitis, chicken pox and seasonal awareness.
- Health check-up of around 2968 students attending the residential semester was conducted.
- Blood donation programs were organised at the main campus.
- To ensure safe drinking water, water sample from eight buildings of BracU, hostel, and Savar campus was collected and tested at the labs of MNS department and ICDDR, B.
- The medical team made daily visits to the BracU Female accommodation and BracU cafeteria at both the Mohakhali and Savar campus to ensure healthy environment and food hygiene.
- The medical team collected blood samples to be tested at the laboratories of the MNS and Pharmacy departments.
- The medical team disposed of lab waste product from the Pharmacy labs maintaining the proper protocol for disposal of hazardous materials.

Office of the Registrar

The mission of the Office of the Registrar is to provide students with best possible services and the most up-to-date and supportive information in an efficient and expeditious manner. To that end, the Office supports the academic mission of the university by providing administrative, logistics support and assistance to the university community. The office of registrar is segmented into focused branches, each responsible for its own territory as well the collaboration across the board.

Office of Admissions

This office is responsible for all admissions in BracU and for certifying student enrolment in collaboration BracU Office of Admissions (OAD), which administers the entire admission and registration procedure. Their core activities are:

Office of Communications

The Office of Communications (OoC) is a key player in the niche BracU comfortably carved out for itself in the world of higher education. Be it media coverage, event management and documentation, promotional material development or the evolution of synergy and rapport, OoC shines the spotlight on the BracU brand, ensuring that the message disperses far and wide. OoC delves into the depths of BracU's melting pot of students, teachers and

staff and, on a daily basis, manages comprehensive corporate marketing, communications and implementation of PR strategies, keeping BU one step ahead in its league. To keep stakeholders up-to-date and maintain a top-notch network, OoC makes use of, among the myriad of platforms, the BracU website, the BracU Facebook page and other evolving and upcoming mediums.

Procurement Department

BracU Procurement department is committed to partner in accomplishing BracU's mission, objectives and goals. The department officials are experienced and hardworking and extensively contributes to the smooth operation of the university's departments, schools and institutes. In the year 2019, The Procurement department continues to be committed to make sure to procure and deliver the right goods, equipment and services at the right time and at the best cost. Keeping in mind the significance of an effective and value-driven procurement department, BracU Procurement department continues to build relationships, maintain professional integrity, and sustain a cost-saving attitude in its everyday work. This department also manages the procurement activities of the BracU New Campus Project.

In 2019, the total purchase amount was around 1,172.87 million taka compared to 162.82 million taka of the previous year. A large portion of this purchase amount, around 986.11 million taka, was for the new campus. Of the remaining amount, 146.05 million taka was for the BracU main campus, 12.85 million taka was for James P Grant School of Public Health and 27.87 million taka was for Brac Institute of Governance and Development.

Some key features of note during 2019 are as follows:

 One of the major tasks for the procurement department is the new campus, which is currently under construction. A significant development of the new campus took place in 2019. Construction of 3 basements and 4 storeys of civil works at zone C have been completed. The construction materials, like rebar and cement, were procured by the

procurement department. Additionally, a significant support for the shipment of the pre-engineering steel imported from China was supported by the procurement department by opening L/C, clearing goods from sea port, providing inland transportation to the site, and etc. Besides the civil part, the procurement department procured different tender packages, like lifts and escalators, fire management systems and substations. The procurement of BBT, fire door, façade, and generator system is under evaluation process. This department has also started the tendering process for HVAC system, security access control system, audio visual and sound system, and solar panel and lightening protection system.

- Introduction of SAP software to strengthen the core procurement process and make procurement faster and more efficient.
- Successful completion of the vendor enlistment for the period of 2020-2021.
- Initiation of Procurement Process Automation which involves shared folder, online invoice tracking and procurement document archiving project.

The department continues to comply with the procurement rules and regulation, faced minimal audit exception, saved cost and created value. The Procurements department is committed to providing maximum services to the university. Therefore, the procurement policy has been reviewed to better suit the changing needs of BracU.

Figure-1: Categories wise Purchase (January-2019 December-2019)




Figure-2: Categories wise Purchase (January- 2019 December- 2019)





Figure-3: Number of Material Requisition requests received from different departments, institutes and schools in 2019 compared to 2018



Relationship Management Office

Achievements

- On January 23, 2019, BracU Business Club (BIZ BEE) and BracU Community Service Club (BUCSC), in association with Bangladesh Thalassemia Foundation, organized Blood Donation Camp. The successful participation resulted in the collection of 205 bags of blood.

International Office



The International Office was established in the later half of 2019 to support the university's vision of becoming a proud global institution from Bangladesh and objective of becoming Bangladesh's international university by 2024.

Strenuous efforts have gone into supporting the Vice Chancellor's drive to reorganize key university functions and establish a more internationally experienced leadership team.

An international strategy was developed in the last quarter of 2019 aimed at

- building BracU's international partnerships, relations and markets insights through curriculum development, faculty exchanges and research collaborations.
- building global opportunities for students through short term mobility programs
- increasing international student recruitment and improving their management
- increasing internationally developed faculty.

A significant number of new, and productive

partnerships have been added to international university partners, which are now available in on a newly developed university wide relationship database.

Initial overseas recruitment trips in South Asia have yielded a reasonable increase in the numbers of international student added to which now sit at the largest number in BracU's history.

In 2019, 16 international students from more eight countries that were offered Brac Scholarships. and 18 international students from five countries, successfully graduated during the year.

Existing recruitment and admissions processes are being redesigned to be more responsive to the needs of international students.

An international office team has been defined and plans to develop the requisite skills among personnel are in place.

Building short term student mobility programs and faculty recruitment activities are underway.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the University to cease to continue as a going concern.
- e) Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the University financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Background of the Organization

BRAC University ("the University") is a private institution of higher education, established in 2001 under clause 6 (1) of the Private University Act 1992 upon approval and certification of the Ministry of Education of the Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh. The address of the University's registered office is 66 Mohakhali C/A, Dhaka-1212.

The University provides educational services primarily for students and trainees at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels, performs research, training and other services. The University's academic organization includes School of Engineering and Computer Science (SECS), BRAC Business School (BBS), School of Law (SoL), School of Architecture and Design, School of Sciences, School of Humanities and Social Sciences, School of Life Science, Graduate School of Management, James P. Grant School of Public Health (JPGSPH), In addition the University also operates the BRAC Institute of Government and Development (BIGD), BRAC Institute of Educational Development (BIED) and BRAC Institute of Languages (BIL).

2. Basis of preparation of financial statements

2.01 Reporting framework and compliance thereof

The financial statements of the University are prepared in conformity with the Financial Transactions Recording and Annual Financial Reporting Format" PUFR (Private University Financial Report). For Private Universities in Bangladesh" which is made by University Grants Commission (UGC) of Bangladesh in order to abide by the provisions stipulated in Section 45(1) of Private University Act 2010.

The title and format of financial statements follow the requirements of IFRSs which are to some extent different from the requirement of Private University Act 2010; However, such differences are not material and in the view of management, IFRS format gives a better presentation to the stakeholders.

2.02 Measurement of elements of the financial statements

Measurement is the process of determining the monetary amounts at which the elements of the financial statements are to be recognized and carried in the balance sheet and income and expenditure statement. The measurement basis most commonly adopted by the University in the preparation of its financial statements except for gratuity which are carried and at their present value is historical cost.

2.03 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Bangladesh Taka (Taka/Tk./BDT), which is the University's functional currency. All financial information presented in Taka has been rounded up/off to the nearest integer, except when otherwise indicated.

2.04 Uses of estimates and judgments

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Sec 45(1) of Private University Act 2010 requires management to make judgment, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts and disclosure but do not undermine the reliability of the financial statements. Actual results may differ from these estimates.



Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future period affected.

2.05 Going concern

When preparing financial statements, management makes an assessment of University's ability to continue as a going concern. University prepares financial statements on a going concern basis.

2.06 Accrual basis of accounting

BRAC University prepares its financial statements, except for cash flow information, following the accrual basis of accounting. Since the accrual basis of accounting is used, University recognizes items as assets, liabilities, funds, income and expenses (when the elements of financial statements) after satisfying the definitions and recognition criteria for those elements in the Framework.

2.07 Materiality and aggregation

University presents each material class of similar items. University presents separately items of a dissimilar nature or function unless they are immaterial. Financial statements result from processing large numbers of transactions or other events that are aggregated into classes according to their nature or function.

2.08 Offsetting

University does not offset assets and liabilities or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by IFRS. University reports separately both assets and liabilities and income and expenses.

2.09 Comparative information and rearrangement thereof

Comparative figures have been re-arranged wherever considered necessary to ensure better comparability with the current period without causing any impact on the surplus and value of assets and liabilities as reported in the financial statements to ensure the alignment with the updated Reporting Form prescribed by the UGC of Bangladesh.

3.0 Summary of significant accounting policies

The accounting policies are set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by the University.

3.01 Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency of the University at exchange rates at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the reporting date are retranslated to the functional currency at the exchange rate at that date. All exchange differences are recognized in Income and Expenditure Statement.

3.02 Property and equipment

3.02.1 Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment (calculated as the difference between the net proceeds from disposal and the carrying amount of the item) is recognized in Income and Expenditure Statement.



3.02.2 Subsequent costs

Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the University. Ongoing repairs and maintenance are treated expenses as

3.02.3 Depreciation

Items of property and equipment are depreciated from the month they are available for use. Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of items of property and equipment by following the straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives. Depreciation is generally recognized in Income and Expenditure Statement.

Residual value will not be assigned to any fixed assets. Prediction of residual value of assets shall be highly hypothetical at acquisition date as the assets shall be use even after expiry of its estimated economic life and also residual value depends on its physical condition at time of disposal. Therefore, assigning residual value to assets has to be avoiding.

3.03 Leases

Operating leases are not recognized in the University's balance sheet. Payments made under operating leases are recognized in Income and Expenditure Statement on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

3.04 Employee benefits

3.04.1 Staff and faculty gratuity fund

The University maintains a gratuity fund for its eligible staff and faculty. They are entitled to gratuity benefits after completing a minimum period of three years of service with the University. Gratuity payable to all eligible employees at the end of each year has been determined on the basis of existing rules and regulations of the University.

3.04.2 Contributory provident fund

The University maintains a recognized contributory provident fund for its eligible staff and faculty. Provident fund contribution begins from the month when the service of the staff and faculty are confirmed. The employee contributes @ 10% of their basic salary and the employer also contributes the same amount to the fund.

3.05 Provisions, accruals and contingencies

Provisions

A provision is recognised when:

- i) University has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event;
- ii) It is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; and

If these conditions are not met, no provision is recognised.

Accruals

Accruals are liabilities to pay for goods or services that have been received or supplied but have not been paid, invoiced or formally agreed with the supplier, including amount due to employees.

Contingent Liabilities

University does not recognise a contingent liability. A contingent liability is disclosed, unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits is remote.

3.06 Revenue

Revenue comprises tuition fees, admission fees, semester fees, sale of forms and other various fees.

3.07 Grants and grant income

The University receives grant from government, not-for-profit, private and various renowned organizations from Bangladesh and abroad. Donor grants received are initially recorded as Grants received in advance under fund and liabilities in the balance sheet. On the other hand, grants received for scholarship are recorded under Scholarship Fund.

A grant is not recognized until there is reasonable assurance that the University will comply with the conditions attaching to it, and that the grant will be received. Grants are recognized in income on a systematic basis over the periods in which the entity recognizes as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate. Grants are accounted for under income approach under which a grant is recognized in Income and Expenditure Statement over one or more periods.

Grants related to specific expenses are recognized in Income and Expenditure Statement in the same period when relevant expenses incurred. Similarly, grants related to depreciable assets are usually recognized in Income and Expenditure Statement over the periods and in the proportions in which depreciation expense on those assets is recognized.

Grants related assets are presented in the balance sheet after amortization of assets and the same amount is presented as deferred income.

3.08 Financial income and financial expenses

Finance income comprises interest income on bank balances and staff loan. Interest income is recognized on an accrual basis. Financial expenses comprise bank charge, excise duty etc.

3.09 Receivables

Receivables arise principally from course fee, interest on fixed deposits and donor grants.

3.10 Accounts payable and accrued liabilities

Accounts payable and accrued liabilities owing to students, third parties and employees for work performed, goods supplied and services rendered, but not yet paid, at the end of the fiscal period.

3.11 Cash and cash equivalents

i) Cash comprises cash in hand and demand deposits.



ii) Cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investment that are readily convertible to cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. Therefore, investments with maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisitions have been considered as cash equivalents in the financial statements, cash equivalents are held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments rather than for investment or other purposes. However bank overdraft have been included as a component of cash and cash equivalents in the accompanying financial statements.

3.12 Tax

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income chargeable for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

3.13 Events after the reporting period

Events after the reporting period that provide additional information about the University's position at the reporting date are reflected in the financial statements. Events after the reporting period that are not adjusting events are disclosed in the notes when material.

The university has pending litigation of Taka 58,91,79,053.00 with National Board of Revenue (NBR) lying in the appellate division and the Honourable High Court Division of the Supreme Court for assessment of income tax of income year 2002-2003 to 2018-2019. These are mainly due to submission of nil return by the University for those year and assessment made by the income tax authority considering the tax @ 15% on taxable income and interest thereon. The University is the defendant in a claim by the income tax authority alleging non payment of income tax as, per the Income Tax Ordinance, 1984. The University has filed, a counter action and preliminary hearing and discovery proceedings on both actions are in progress. The ultimate outcome of the matter cannot presently be determined and no provision for any liability has been made in the financial statements according to the Tax Authority's claim. It is also noted that the Honourable High Court division stayed the demand of the NBR till disposal of the reference application to the High Court division for the Assessment year 2003-04, 2004-2005, 2005-2006, 2006-2007, 2007-2008, 2008-2009, 2009-2010, 2011-2012 and 2012-2013. Also the Reference applications already submitted to the High Court division for the Assessment year 2010-11, 2013-14 and 2014-15.
